### FREE MUSIC LESSONS IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Was Subject of Woman's Club Program Tuesday; Mrs. E. A. Smith Was Speaker

A meeting of the Highland Park Woman's club was held Tuesday, January sixth. A very interesting program was given demonstrating the results of the free teaching of music in Evanston schools.

Mr. Ernest A. Smith, superintendent of schools in Evanston, stated that they believed with President Elliot, that "every child in the public schools should be taught to sing, play an instrument or listen appreciatively to music," and so private lessons in music are made a part of the school work from the third grade up, and school credit is given for it.

Mr. Osborne McConathy, director of music, explained how tests are given to see what pupils are talented and what instrument they are best fitted to play. 320 pupils are now being given piano lessons and 370 are being given lessons on other instruments.

Demonstrations by children from the singing, piano, and orchestral classes showed what has been accomplished. Evanston is to be congratulated upon this system which they have installed and the questions put to Mr. McConathy after the program showed how interesting the people of Highland Park found the subject.

### JOHN BERNARDI TO ACCEPT NEW POSITION

Will Be Golf Professional At Bellevue Country Club, Melrose, Mass.

### SAYS REPUBLICANS MUST CLEAN HOUSE

#### SENATOR BORAH'S IDEAS

Serves Notice He Will Demand Action in Next Congress; Hints At Foreign Policies

On trial, and facing the urgent necessity of "a most drastic programme of housecleaning." This is Senator William E. Borah's vision of the position of the Republican party during the next four years.

The senator from Idaho, in his first formal statement of the main tasks to be accomplished by the Administration, in the form of an article in the January number of Scribner's Magazine, does not join with the Old Guard in rejoicing over the fact that the LaFollette party polled only five million votes in the last election. He sees something entirely different, an ominous and distinct warning.

Almost one-fifth of all who cast a ballot in the last election registered their conviction that neither of the old parties was longer fit to administer the affairs of government," he asserts. "There was great rejoicing over the fact that the third party did not receive a larger popular vote. In my opinion it was quite large enough to put the party now in power upon notice—notice that a task is at hand, must be recognized and faithfully and courageously discharged."

In his article which is entitled "The Republican Victory—What Shall We Do with It?" the new chairman of the Committee on Foreign Relations indicates an attitude toward world affairs diverging widely from that of the late Senator Lodge, and in closer accord with President Coolidge's policy.

He attributes the Republican victory largely to the personality of the President. "They trusted Coolidge, and it is up to the party to give him active and aggressive support in what should be a most drastic programme of housecleaning."

Refusal to face their obligations by either old party is termed by Senator Borah as "a self-confessed judgment either of pathetic incompetence or sordid betrayal."

By this spirited declaration Senator Borah gives notice to the right wing of the Republican party that his new duties as chairman of the Senate Committee on Foreign Relations will not weigh him down, nor keep him from demanding action from the Administration on the issues facing it. It indicates that he will wage a vigorous campaign for careful study of the questions before the Congress and against jamming through slapdash legislation on and at the last moment.
