MME. PONAFIDINE IS INTERESTING LECTURER

Talk on Experiences in Soviet Russia Greatly Enjoyed by The Ossoli Club

The regular meeting of the Ossoli Club took place Tuesday afternoon at the Highland Park club house.

Mrs. Leverone and Mrs. Vaughan were appointed delegates to the 10th District meeting at the Highland Park Woman's Club, Jan. 20th. Mrs. Bradley spoke of the hospital drive and urgent need of funds.

Mrs. Daniel Cobb paid a tribute to the memory of Mrs. Bowen Schumacher, a past president and a valued and beloved member who had passed away since the last meeting, and presented the resolutions drawn up by the board as a special meeting.

The speaker of the afternoon, Mme. Ponafidine, who told of her experiences in Soviet Russia and her subsequent escape from the Bolshevik country, is one of the most interesting personalities in the lecture field today.

Born in Persia of American Missionary parents, married to a Russian diplomat, Mme. Ponafidine spent many years in the various countries of Asia and Europe, finally retiring with her husband to their estate in Russia and living there until after her husband's death, when she managed to escape with her two sons from the Bolshevik terrors.

Those who heard Mme. Ponafidine's story of her life under Soviet rule, of her party's escape across the water to Finland, stepping from cake to cake of ice, with Bolshevik searchlights playing upon them, were not only intensely interested but deeply thrilled as was evidenced by the continued applause at the end.

O greater moment, however, than the story of her thrilling escape was the true account of what is actually going on in Soviet Russia today. Mme. Ponafidine does not hesitate to say that recognition of the Soviet by the other nations would eventually mean the establishing of communism throughout the world bringing with it the complete downfall of all we hold sacred today—religion, authority, and family sanctity.

BOY SCOUTS CONTEST FOR VACATION CAMP

One from Each Troop Having Highest Points Winner; Evanston Scouts Here

The regular troop meetings were held during the week and on Sunday a meeting of the scoutmasters, assistant scoutmasters, patrol leaders, assistant patrol leaders, and other executives was held. BOARD OF HEALTH ISSUES STATEMENT

Regarding Smallpox at Deerfield And Typhoid in Neighboring Communities

The following statement is issued by the local board of health.

Smallpox has appeared in Deerfield and there is greater danger of its appearing in Highland Park. Vaccination is the best and practically only method of preventing smallpox. Therefore be vaccinated. All persons who have not been vaccinated within five years should be vaccinated at once. All school children must be vaccinated. Vaccination as now done with fine, glycerinated vaccine from healthy tested calves, gives very little inconvenience. Do not scratch the spot of vaccination. You may infect it from your finger nails. Do not wear a vaccine shield. It prevents the scab from drying and makes infection easier.

Typhoid is about us. Several cases have appeared in surrounding towns. These have been usually traced to the eating of raw oysters. So many have occurred and so universally have they been caused by raw oysters that the department of health of Illinois has issued special rules. After today the eating of raw oysters is illegal in Illinois.

At restaurant, hotel, or eating place may serve raw oysters.

If you wish to eat oysters, have them cooked. Do not eat them raw.
