The following statement is issued by the local board of health. Smallpox has appeared in Deerfield and there is greater danger of its appearing in Highland Park. Vaccination is the best and practically only method of preventing smallpox. Therefore be vaccinated. All persons who have not been vaccinated within five years should be vaccinated at once. All school children must be vaccinated. Vaccination as now done with fine, glycerinated vaccine from healthy tested calves, gives very little inconvenience. Do not scratch the wear a vaccine shield. It prevents the scab from drying and makes in-
