

COUNTY BENEFITS BY ROAD PROGRAM

NEAR MILLION AND HALF Amount of Highway Improvement By State In Lake Co. In 1925 Is Indicated by Routes Named

Lake county will benefit to the extent of almost one-half a million dollars in the 1925 road building program, according to word from the state highway headquarters at Springfield. This work is included in the state bond issue program.

The most important stretch for this county is the part extending east from Lake Zurich to Waukegan road, passing through Half Day. This is known as Route 22 Section 20, and is 11 and one half miles long. The cost, exclusive of the cement price, is \$252,511.26.

Charles E. Russell, county superintendent of the highways, reports that the county has been working long on Route 22. The right of way was only recently secured.

The other route is split between Lake and McHenry counties. The stretch is composed of routes 19 and 22, Sections 24, 25, and 18, and is 12.99 miles in length. The cost is placed at \$223,227.08. The route runs through Barrington and Crystal Lake and into McHenry county through Half Day. The stretch was recently graded, preparatory to the paving work.

The combined cost of the two improvements is \$475,738.34.

Without the cement, which the state itself buys, the jobs throughout the state will cost more than \$13,027,000. These improvements are scattered from one end of the state to the other, involving sixty counties.

The combined program is probably the largest amount of road work any state or governmental agency in this country has awarded to contractors at one time. While the average cost per mile is indicated as \$20,150, to that must be added the cost of the cement which will be purchased under other bids.

PEDESTRIANS MUST SIGNAL ON CROSSING New Law in Los Angeles Makes Those Who Walk Share In Averting Accident

After July 22, 1925, anybody trying to drive a horse into the downtown business district of Los Angeles will be arrested. Dobbin is peremptorily banished from a district several square miles in area, under the McClintock tariff ordinance, effective January 22, but six months grace is allowed for gradual enforcement of the new rules. During the six months equine vehicles are expelled from this area in rush hours.

The new ordinance provides for traffic lanes and rules for pedestrians the same as motorists. There will be "walking" and "standing" signs and encroaching programs will entitle their wearers to fine and imprisonment. The signs for pedestrians will be painted on sidewalks.

Jay walking is expressly forbidden, and those who cross the streets afoot are to be compelled to signal their intention with upraised arms, just like autoists signal for turns. If an unfortunate hiker carries bundles in both hands, he can make two trips, each time with one arm full, but he needs must hold that palm up or tell it to the judge. It's in the new traffic ordinances, in black and white.

TO REBUILD GREECE TASK OF AMERICAN

C. P. Howland, New York Lawyer Is In Charge of Project Costing Millions

The rebuilding of Greece, one of the largest international jobs ever planned by the powers, is the task set for Charles P. Howland, a New York lawyer who will sail for Europe in a few days to become head of the International Refugee Loan commission in Athens.

"This is an epochal undertaking in post-war reconstruction," said Charles V. Vickery, general secretary of the Near East Relief, at a farewell luncheon given to Mr. Howland. "More than fifty million dollars has been entrusted to Mr. Howland by investors in England and America, and the confidence of these investors is an indication of the great success which is anticipated for his undertaking."

"This is an age of the unprecedented. Centuries must pass before the effects of the recent changes in the Near East can be fully understood from the standpoint of the historian. Yet it is evident that they will be far-reaching, and profound, affecting the fundamental structure of our international civilization."

"The Near East Relief and its thousands of contributors have been largely instrumental in laying the foundations for Mr. Howland's mission. They will co-operate with him in carrying it out. His task is to put a million refugees in Greece on a self-supporting basis. The problem is economic."

MORTALITY STATISTICS

Mortality took a sharp upward swing during December in the country generally according to telegraphic reports from 64 cities involving a population of 27,000,000. The reported death rate for this group in December was considerably higher than that for the corresponding month in either of the three previous years. Since mortality during the first three months of the year is almost always higher than in any other months, the noticeable upward tendency in December is regarded as significant.

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Watch Plumbing Uncle Sam Cautions! Hoover Issues Standard Code Washington, D. C.—The Department of Commerce have approved a "people's plumbing code" with the hope that it may be adopted by states and municipalities, it was announced. The bill is for the protection of the public "from unsanitary plumbing, the use of defective and cheap material and improper installation." The code was prepared by a special committee appointed by Secretary Hoover and headed by William C. Groeniger of Cleveland.

NEW FIGHT OVER INHERITANCE TAX

Appeal Filed in Smith Case to Collect Larger Sum; Objection Overruled

Despite the fact that on Dec. 3, Acting County Judge Martin J. Decker allowed an inheritance tax of \$78,000 against the estate of the late Delevan Smith, Lake Forest publisher, Assistant Attorney General R. W. Churchill of Grayslake last week filed a motion asking an appeal to the supreme court in a further effort to collect \$175,000 tax he claims is the correct amount. Atty. Miller, McCulloch and Feld, representing the state opposed the motion on the point that it should have been made Dec. 31, the last day of the term and also that Churchill's term as assistant attorney general has expired. Judge Decker overruled the point and the state was allowed forty days to prepare a bill of exceptions.

CONSTANTINOPLE IS LOSING ITS GLORY

Constantinople is a dying city, writes a correspondent of the Temps who has been inspecting the work of the Near East Relief in Palestine, Syria, and Greece. Half the population of the city are refugees, he asserts, and the other half are living mainly by pillage and spoil. One-fifth of the city is in ruins from a series of conflagrations; the once-busy harbor is deserted; business and commerce are non-existent; foreigners are leaving en masse. Revolution and civil war have extinguished the old Black Sea trade, and departure of 300,000 Greeks and Armenians has prostrated economic activities. The sea-borne commerce which formerly centered in Constantinople has been deflected to Athens, Beirut, and Salonika. The correspondent declares that American relief work in the Near East has been one of the greatest factors in the maintenance of law and order under chaotic political and economic conditions.

CHICAGO MOTOR CLUB ANNUAL MEETING DANCE

More than 15,000 motorists are expected to attend the annual meeting, dance and entertainment of the Chicago Motor club at the Coliseum, January 15.

Thomas P. Henry, president of the American Automobile association will be the principal speaker of the evening. The meeting January 15 will mark the entrance of the Chicago Motor club into the 19th year of motoring service. The meeting is expected to be the largest ever held by any automobile club in the country.

There will be high grade vaudeville from Chicago loop theatres and dancing following the business meeting. The club reports that a large number of local motorists have signified their intention of being present at this meeting.

BLAMES ALCOHOL IN RADIATOR FOR STEW

Alcohol fumes from the radiator of his automobile intoxicated an Evanston motorist, according to the story the man told Justice of the Peace John J. Bunch. When the man was stopped while driving his car in rather uncertain fashions, he gave Justice Bunch this weird excuse for his apparent intoxicated condition. The justice let him go with the warning that he would not accept the same tale again.
