DEERFIELD

The mother of 1935, what will she be like?

Quite frequently we hear this subject discussed, not as a matter of vain conjecture, but as a matter of vital interest. This is not unwarranted when we consider that as are the mothers of a nation, so is its citizenry.

It is a recognized fact that whatever the aim in life, special training is necessary. Unfortunately however, many girls go out to tackle the biggest job in the world, that of being a mother, without adequate preparation.

The above paragraphs are excerpts from the illustrated mimeographed invitations given every girl at the grammar school.

Any girl seven years old or older is eligible to join and there is also a junior organization for the younger ones.

At the tea given by Mrs. Newcomb, Monday afternoon, plans were formulated for two groups of Campfire Girls, those from 11 to 14 and others from 15 to 18 years of age.

Other states represented at the Chicago meeting included Missouri, Minnesota, Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Kentucky, Nebraska, Kansas, North Dakota and South Dakota.

Latest reports on the situation in the Greek refugee camps were submitted by Gordon Berry of Geneva, Switzerland, who visited Greece a few weeks ago as the representative of a commission of the League of Nations. Charles V. Vickery of New York, general secretary of the Near East relief, said that his organization

would administer all funds for refugee relief without charge.

Another speaker was Captain Frank M. America of Buffalo, N. Y., an American newspaper correspondent just returned from Greece, who said that a fund of moderate amount would save the lives of many thousand children at this time. "It is a critical period in the whole refugee situation," he declared. "The entire problem of reconstruction in Greece depends for its solution on the ability of the charitable organizations to assist and support the helpless refugees in the camps, during the peak of the winter weather."

Heating Equipment

Stoves or heating equipment must be safely installed with proper clearances to ceilings and walls. Stoves must have metal protection under them. Ceilings and walls must be similarly protected if the clearances are close.

"Every school must be kept free from rubbish and inflammable material must be kept away from fire."

County superintendents are given power to withhold from any district which maintains an unsafe school building its portion of the distribution fund until such building shall have been made safe, the letter points out.

Barred Windows Dangerous

"Barred windows are criminal unless the barring device is set on hinges or otherwise arranged so that it can be pushed out instantly and easily from the inside in case of emergency."

"Single exits from any room or from the building are criminal. Every room should have two doors. Every building should have at least two sets of exit doors of ample size. All exit doors must open outward and have panic bolt equipment."

"If kerosene or gasoline lamps are used, they should be of the best, approved sorts. They should be hung or placed safely. They should be removed at the first sign that anything is out of order. An odor of gas or oil indicates that vapor is escaping and is a sure sign of danger."
