#### Organizing Teams

Each ambulance driver for the last week has been busily organizing a team sufficiently large to cover the district he has selected. It is estimated that no fewer than two hundred workers will make the concerted appeal for the \$10,000 for each of three years which the hospital is seeking on next Sunday, January 25. Be sure to be at home until you are called on by a solicitor!

A short and snappy campaign like that planned for the hospital can succeed only if there is sufficient machinery working like clockwork. In order that there may be a thorough understanding of the plans for work on Sunday it is absolutely essential that every worker be present at the Highland Park Woman's club on Saturday night at the complimentary dinner to be given to the workers. Each ambulance driver's place will be marked at the tables and workers will seat themselves near their driver. Mrs. R. J. Beatty is in charge of arrangements for music and is writing the "campaign song."

At the speakers' table will be seated the campaign executive committee, Mr. Sellar Bullard, chairman; Rev. P. W. MacDonald, who will ask the blessing; Mayor Hastings, who will speak for the city of Highland Park; Mr. George Rosseter, who will lead in the singing; Mrs. Helen Farquhar Sanford, campaign director, and guests of the campaign executive committee. Jack J. Weber, editor of "The Modern Hospital," also will be a guest.

#### At Woman's Club

All workers will gather in the auditorium of the Woman's club from which place they will be directed downstairs to dinner. After the dinner the full plan of campaign organization will be outlined and workers' supplies distributed. WORKERS! PUT DOWN SATURDAY NIGHT FOR THE HOSPITAL DINNER!

Next week a complete account of the returns from the campaign, including a list of those serving so efficiently on all committees, will be given in the columns of the Press; also the winners of the blue and red ribbons to be awarded ambulance drivers who reach the hospital first with the largest sum of money secured, or the greatest number of calls made in the campaign.

Special mention might be made at this time of a large and representative group of women serving under the direction of Mrs. Moses Eisenstaedt, each day this week at the City Hall, in handling the thousands of cards and folders which are being typed and mailed. At City Hall and at their homes women have been typing cards to be used by the solicitors in Highland Park, Highwood, Deerfield and Northbrook and addressing folders to be sent to these towns and Glencoe.

Glencoe residents interested in the hospital are being sent pledge cards with the folders which it is hoped they will fill out and mail promptly to the Campaign Office at City Hall, Highland Park. There will be no teams of solicitors at work in Glencoe.

Promptly on Sunday afternoon, at two o'clock, with a ringing of church bells, the army of men and women who are volunteering their services for the sake of the hospital will begin their solicitation. 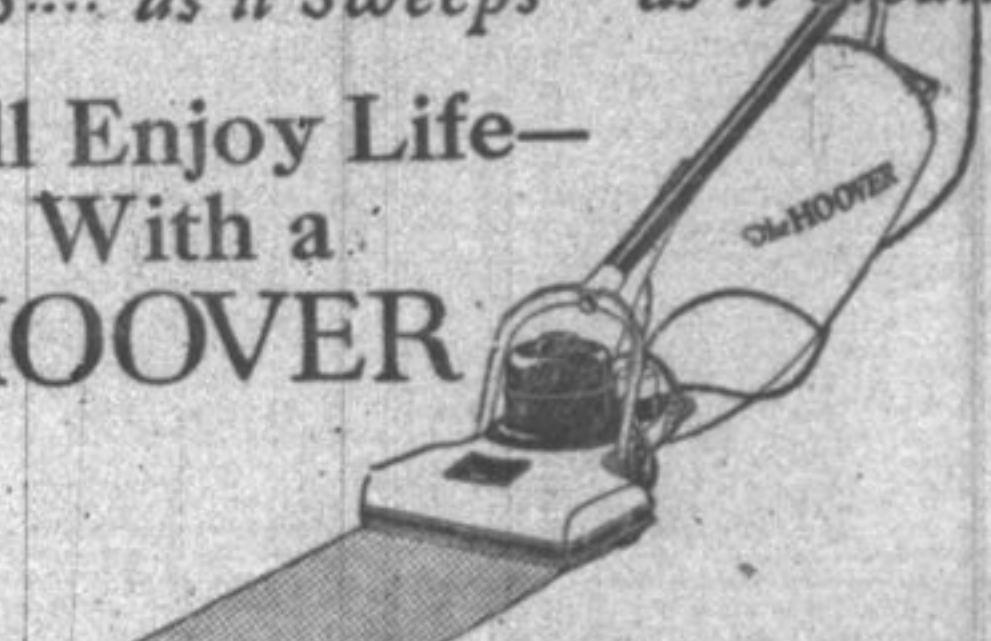
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### PLAN SURVEY OF ARMENIAN FORESTS
