## ECLIPSE OF SUN IS EARLY ON SATURDAY

The first total eclipse of the sun to be seen in the United States in many years will occur early on Saturday morning of this week. It will be total for people living on a strip of territory from Duluth east to the vicinity of New York. In the vicinity of Chicago it will be about nineteenth-twentieth total at its climax. The sun will rise about 7:11 a. m., already about one-fifth obscured by the moon. The great solar orb will gradually darken as the moon passes between it and the earth until at 7:58 the height of the eclipse, as seen here, will be reached. The shadow will leave the sun about nine o'clock. If the skies are clear this will be a unique and rare sight.

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## WEEKLY LECTURE WELL ATTENDED

Much Interest in Franklyn Snyder Course at the Woman's Club

Professor Franklyn Bliss Snyder's subject on Wednesday afternoon was "Our Contemporary American Novel." He gave his method of evaluating American fiction which is first facts, second, imagination, and, last, technique of craft. In part Prof. Snyder said that America is too young to keep pace with our English friends in literature of today and that he considers American women writers ahead of men writers with Edith Wharton's work paramount. Of her he said, "She never prostitutes her art." Margaret Deland, Dorothy Canfield Fisher, Willa Cather and Edna Ferber lead in the field of fiction. Edna Ferber's "So Big," is "a glorification of heroic motherhood."

Joseph Hergesheimer, 12 years ago when he wrote "Java Head" was the best equipped novelist on the continent. James Branch Cabell is an idealist who lives in an illusory literary world. In closing Prof. Snyder said, "Out of our American nation will arise someone who will contribute more richly in the future than in the past."
