WOMEN'S CLUBS TO RADIO PROGRAMS

Many Local Organizations Are Invited By Station To "Go On Air"

Programs by women's clubs in the middle west will be broadcast from radio station WLS beginning January 26, according to information received here today. A woman's radio club contest has been inaugurated with a view of bringing out the best in club programs for broadcasting.

Beginning with the last week of this month and on every Monday and Friday afternoon thereafter, the homemakers hour programs are to be put on by some women's organization. The first district of the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs, of which Mrs. Joseph A. Worker of Chicago is president, will arrange the initial program. Mrs. Grace Viall Gray, president of the second Illinois district and a widely known home economics expert, will be in charge of these programs from the Sears-Roebuck station.

Present plans call for clubs to make application for dates and submit programs at least two weeks in advance. The winner will be determined by the largest number of commendatory messages from listeners-in, who will be the judges of the programs. Votes may be cast for as many programs as desired, but the club receiving the largest number of letters of appreciation will be awarded the prize. Applications and suggestion from clubs as to the nature of the prize will be welcome.

OLD VEHICLE FIRM QUILTS WAGON LINE

Well Known Concern in Quincy, Illinois Abandons Type of Business

The passing of the horse has taken with it one of the oldest industries in Quincy, Ill.—a wagon and buggy factory. The Koenig and Luhrs company, founded in 1868, and one of the largest concerns of its kind in the middle west, has announced it will close its vehicle manufacturing business March 1.

For a number of years the company specialized in the construction of heavy vans for moving furniture and large trucks for heavy freight hauling. Ten years ago the company began the manufacture of automobile bodies as a side line.

AGED LIBERTYVILLE SKATER IN MOVIES

Wm. Whigham, 88, Disports on Ice And Gains Attention of News Reel Co.

A representative of a Chicago news reel feature service for the movies recently was in Libertyville taking a movie of William Whigham in his now famous skating act.

The pictures were taken on the local rink in Cook Memorial park and the movie man said that they will show some of the peppiest skating he has ever witnessed.

Mr. Whigham is 88 years of age and has issued a challenge to any man over sixty for contest in free for all, open work or fancy skating.

At a meeting of the Illinois Commerce commission last week in Springfield, representative of former railroads appeared to request the commission to authorize an advance of about 20 percent in the suburban fares running out of Chicago. This will include all the North Shore on the Northwestern running as far as Kenosha which is a part of the suburban territory. It also affects the Illinois Central, Chicago & Alton, and C. B. & Q. Railroad officials presented evidence to prove that the railroads have been losing much money by keeping the suburban fares where they have been for sometime.

The commission took no definite action but has it under consideration and a ruling will be made within the next few weeks.

NEW YORK MAY HAVE 88-STORY BUILDING

Tests Being Made Indicate Plan Of Gigantic Syndicate For 1000-Foot Structure

New York is to have an 88-story office building, far outranking in height the Woolworth building, which has 51 stories, according to meager information obtainable in real estate circles. The test, recently announced, to determine whether the Woolworth tower says in winds of high velocity is said to have been undertaken in contemplation of the skyscraper's construction.

No definite information regarding the new building will be given the public for the present, it was said at the offices of Cass Gilbert, architect. It was admitted that the project was under consideration, although details are being withheld because negotiations for the size have not been closed.

The new mammoth structure will occupy an entire block in downtown Broadway, it was said.

Leaders in the architectural, engineering and construction world were called into conference to determine the practicability of rearing a structure of such height, it was explained, and as a result it was decided to make a study of the Woolworth building. Whether the new skyscraper will be built to the height contemplated will depend upon the outcome of the tests.

The Woolworth building is 792 feet high, and if the stories of the contemplated building were of the same height, it would tower more than 1000 feet above the ground.

The United States Steel corporation and the du Ponts have been mentioned as possible backers of the new building project, although no definite information as to this phase has been obtained.

TELEPHONE SERVICE IN EUROPE IS BAD

Dr. Frank Crane on Return Is Quoted As Saying It Is Very Poor

Writing that he has just returned from a holiday abroad, Dr. Frank Crane declares in "Current Opinion" that neither in rainy France, nor foggy E-tain, nor Fascist Italy, nor in neat Netherlands, nor in cowed Germany could he detect decent telephone service; that the telephone, as we understand it, is simply unknown outside of America. Why should we be the only people on earth to be so favored? asks Dr. Crane. "Of course," he adds, "we invented the telephone and developed it, but other countries have been at liberty to buy instruments, and set up systems of their own. Why have they not done so? What is the matter with the other systems?"

Dr. Crane found the problem an interesting one and he states that he has found the answer to these questions. He adds, "In the first place ours is the only telephone system which managed from the first to find the right man at every stage of its development to turn it into the marvellously efficient instrument it has become. Second, ours is the only government which has had the wisdom to let the telephone alone, to let it grow up and do its beneficial work. In this country the telephone is a free citizen. Elsewhere it is usual and ill-equipped, underfed, frowzily uniformed soldier of the state—the war-making state which needs it to assist in mobilizing the people."

CLOTHING BURGLARS GET 1 TO 20 YEARS

Two Men Who Stole \$8,000 Worth From Waukegan Store Are Sentenced

Herbert Perlberg and Walter Walkowski of Chicago, who broke into the J. H. Peterson and company clothing store at Waukegan on Oct. 3, 1924, and stole \$8,000 worth of suits, were found guilty of burglary in the Circuit court of Judge Claire C. Edwards last week when a jury returned a verdict in record time.

It took the jury only half an hour to decide that the two young men were guilty. A net of evidence through which there was no loophole for escape had been wound about Perlberg and Walkowski by State's Attorney A. V. Smith.

Judge Edwards later sentenced the two men to the penitentiary for a period of from one to twenty years. They were remanded to Sheriff Ahlstrom to be taken to Joliet.

A motion for a new trial made by Attorney James G. Welch counsel for the two, was overruled by the court. No appeal was taken as the defendants evidently felt that it was useless to carry the fight to a higher court.

TAX RATE INCREASE PLAN IS OPPOSED

Favored by Lake Co. Board But Much Opposition Is Met Down State

Some time ago Lake county board of supervisors went on record to back enactment of a proposed bill to permit cities of Illinois below 200,000 in population to levy a tax up to \$1.75 per hundred instead of \$1.33, but the idea is meeting with considerable opposition in downstate territory.

The most recent opposition comes from Bloomington, in McLean county. The city council of Bloomington believes the tendency should be to reduce taxes, rather than to increase them. Bloomington has a debt of only \$160,000, which is being reduced yearly. The maximum of bonded indebtedness which Bloomington can carry is \$1,000,000.

In Lake county, and a few others, the situation is different, it is argued, the communities being older and comparable to Chicago, which some years ago obtained special legislation to raise the tax rate in order to meet present day requirements.

WHEAT NOT INJURED BY COATING OF ICE

Tests Made at Springfield Indicate Protection Given By Snow Is Help

Wheat in central Illinois was not injured by the severe December ice storm which swept this region, laboratory tests conducted by the farm bureau at Springfield, indicate. Samples taken from the ice coated fields turned green in the warm laboratory.

Much ice still remains on the fields under the snow. The snow cover extends over much of the state, according to the weather bureau here, protecting the wheat from cold.

MANY REFUGEES DIE OF NEGLECT REPORT

The return of Turkish peasants from Greece to Anatolia is taking on the aspects of a great tragedy, according to advices reaching the Near East relief here. It is estimated that nearly a third of the 350,000 Turks who have already arrived in Asia Minor have died of malaria and starvation diseases owing to the neglect of the Angora government.
