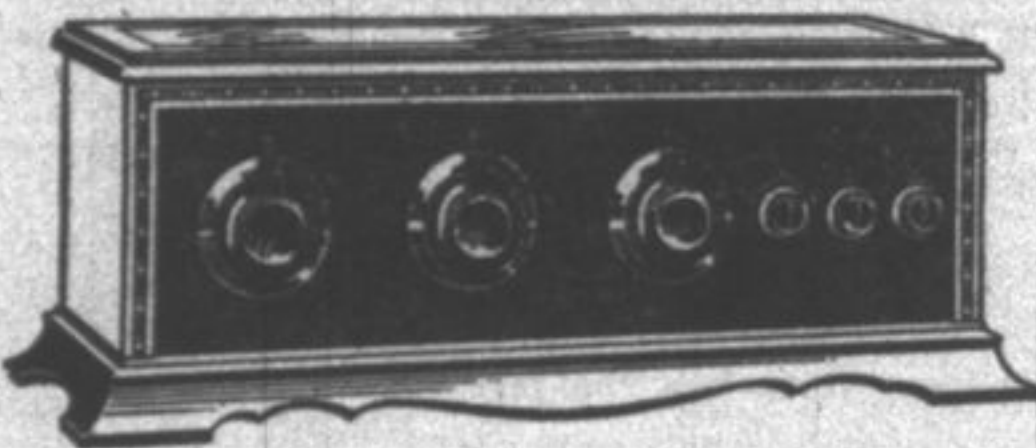

ERADICATION URGED FOR THE BARBERRY

Farmers of Lake County Seeking Co-operation of State in This Project

Farmers of Lake county are asking that active steps be taken this year to eradicate barberry bushes. The state department of health started agitation in Lake County last fall at the Lake County fair when the disastrous effects of barberry were pointed out, and suggestions were made how the danger could be eliminated. The field activities for the year 1924 in the state barberry eradication campaign indicate that more than 90,000 common barberry bushes were located and destroyed in 20 counties in Illinois last season. The survey includes 42 counties in the northern half of the state. An effort will be made to direct efforts to Lake county this year.

A large area of Berberis Canadensis was discovered this year in Tazewell county near Peoria. Authorities on botany were much interested in the discovery, as this particular species of barberry has never been found before in Illinois. James A. Twardock and Earl D. Cornwell of the University of Illinois have been employed all season on the barberry eradication field force. Upon completing his duties at Urbana, Mr. Cornwell will return to Washington, D. C.

The common barberry is being eradicated because it harbors and spreads the blade stem rust disease of wheat, oats, barley and rye. Each year it is estimated that the yield of small grains is reduced by 50 million bushels.
