TYPICAL AMERICAN CITY IS CHICAGO

SOCIOLOGY EXPERT SAYS

Declares It Most Modern Also Of World's Great Cities; Defends Urban Life Against Rural

Chicago was held up as the typical American city, the city whose growth and development is confounding the scientists themselves, by Prof. William L. Bailey, head of the department of sociology of Northwestern university, in a lively argument among savants at the annual meeting of national sociologists at the Auditorium hotel recently.

Warren S. Thompson of the Scripps foundation, a man noted for research work in and among American communities, had defended rural life and held it up as the saving feature of our civilization. Dr. Bailey of Northwestern, himself a rural sociologist, refuted the argument that cities naturally promote sterility and held up Chicago as the shining example.

Most Modern City
"Chicago is the most modern of the world's great cities," said Prof. Bailey, "having grown to metropolitan status more quickly than any other known in the world's history. It has until recently grown almost wholly by external recruiting from abroad and from the great middle west, but it now increases almost as much by natural processes within as from without. This achievement is the result of extremely low mortality and by control of morbidity by such notable sanitary enterprises as the drainage canal. Chicago may well be esteemed the world's greatest metropolis of a vast agricultural region and at the same time pioneering as the modern city marching swiftly toward sounder vital conditions."

Upholds Rural Life
Mr. Thompson in upholding the rural side of life, said: "There can be no reasonable doubt that rural conditions are much more favorable to a settled family life and the rearing of fair-sized families than urban communities. Children are of greater economic usefulness on farms than they are in towns and cities, and country girls are better trained as home-makers than city girls, have less opportunity to enter other kinds of work and consequently marry earlier, with the expectation of raising a family. Keeping up with the Joneses is not as likely to be regarded essential by country women as by city women. Farming requires settled life and children do not constitute for farm women the sole tie to her home as is true of the city mother. It seems probable that country people are less affected than city people by the numerous causes which lead to involuntary sterility."

Bailey's Reply
Replying directly to this thrust from his distinguished colleague, Prof. Bailey said:
"Cities are not primarily seed-plots of population as are the rural districts, from which, in the first stage of their development, they draw their population. Their function in society, however, is not production but organization and control. Their vital conditions are as much an adjustment to conditions in new and growing centers as are those of country populations to their special life-conditions."

At this point, Prof. Bailey thought of Chicago and her amazing growth and cited this to unhorse his worthy foe.

CLUB WOMEN PLAN ART WEEK FEB. 7-12

Will Term It "Buy A Picture Week"; To Boost Interest Generally In Art

The clubs of the state have set aside the week beginning February 7 as "Art Week." It will be called "Buy a Picture Week," and they will urge every one, if possible, to purchase a work of art during that week. It will be a state-wide movement, and it is planned to have local exhibitions of paintings and sculpture in the leading towns throughout the state. The movement is sponsored by the art department of the Illinois Federation of Women's clubs. Mrs. Charles Leigh, of 456 Normal Parkway, Chicago, is chairman of the local branch.

It is hoped to interest clubs, hotels, business organizations, banks, public buildings, schools, libraries, and private homes in the campaign to purchase works of art. The standard of works submitted at the various exhibitions will be high, and will be confined to artists whose work is accepted for exhibition by the leading museums of the country. The art of a nation is its greatest asset. America spends millions a year in visiting the art centers of Europe, but our own are development lags far behind that of our mechanical and scientific growth. A movement such as "Buy a Picture Week," which has behind it the power of the women's clubs of the state, is sure to advance the cause of art appreciation among the people.

HUGE SUM RECEIVED IN AUTOMOBILE FEES

THE SECRETARY REPORTS

Total For 1924 Exceeds Eleven And One-Half Million Dollars; Increase Over Year 1923

Collections by the automobile department of the secretary of State's office for 1924 show an increase of \$1,892,411.21 over total collections by the department in 1923, according to a statement issued today by Louis L. Emmerson, secretary of state.

Total Receipts
The statement shows a total of \$11,546,206.25 collected by the department during 1924. Of this amount \$10,722,266.24 was collected in fees on passenger cars and trucks, \$349,766.50 from chauffeurs licenses, and \$148,590.65 from transfers.

During the year 1,132,641 licenses were issued, 978,428 of which were issued on passenger cars, 140,808 on trucks, 4,488 in dealers licenses, 2,044 on trailers, and 6,873 issued on motor cycles. There were 95,343 licenses issued to chauffeurs.

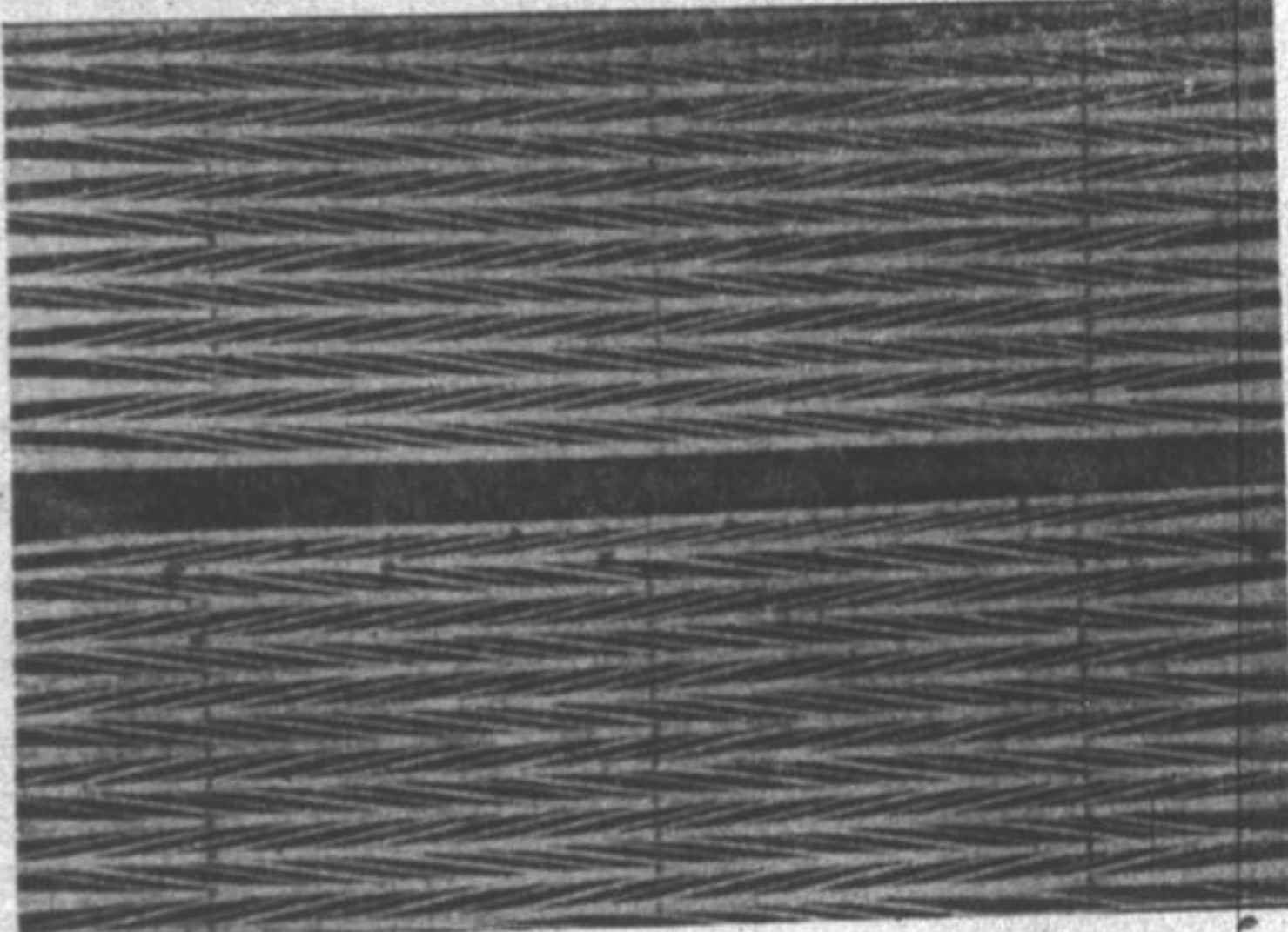

Comparative tests made by Robert W. Hunt & Co., Engineers

IDENTICAL panels with frames four feet high and eight feet long, constructed with sills and studs 7 1/2 x 3 1/2 in. and studs placed 16 in. on centers, were prepared.
FRAME A had one side covered with 3/8 x 6 in. dressed sheathing nailed at each stud with 8D nails, and the other side covered with common lath spaced 2 in. on centers and staggered in the usual way.
FRAME B was covered on both sides with Expanded Wood Lath sheets 8 ft. long and 16 in. wide, fastened at the juncture of each rib and stud with 5D nails.
In testing these panels the bottom sill was clamped to the base of the testing machine and the pull applied to the top sill in the direction of its length.
Expanded Wood Lath, by this test, has been proved much stiffer than the old standard construction. But added to this advantage are its high insulating qualities and the much lower construction cost when used for either exterior stucco or interior plaster.
