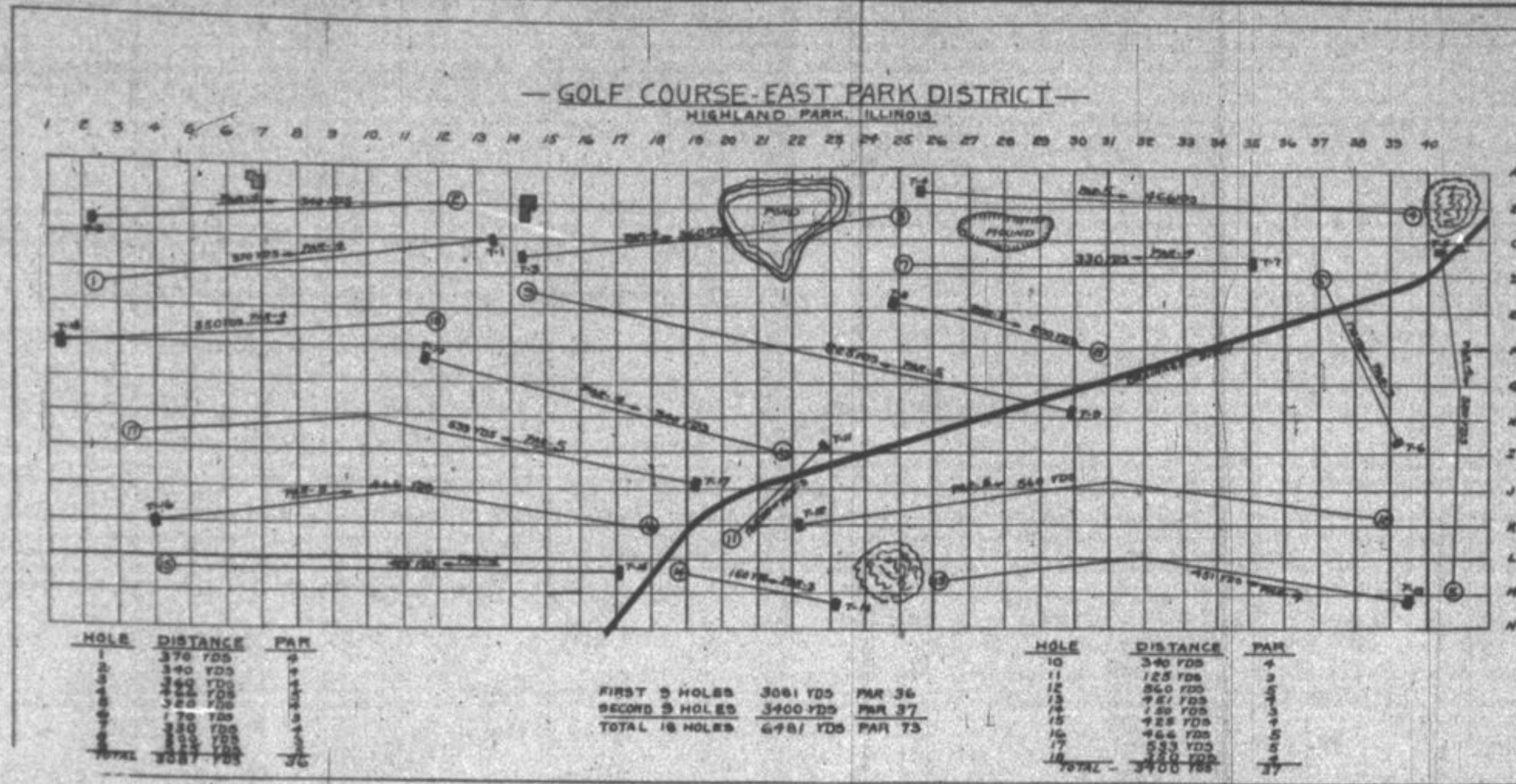


Map of Park District 18-Hole Golf Course

OPERATOR'S HUNCH SAVES GIRL'S LIFE

Central Alarmed by Trouble On Line Sends Aid; Discovers Patron Overcome

A premonition on the part of a switchboard operator in a Los Angeles telephone office and the prompt application of first aid efforts by a "trouble shooter," dispatched by the girl at the telephone to ascertain the source of the trouble, recently halted a tragedy and saved Miss Margaret Martin from death by gas.

The girl was about to call her chum on the telephone when she was overcome. The receiver dropped from her hand, and the operator, sensing that there was something wrong, reported the situation to her supervisor who rushed the "trouble shooter" to the scene.

Reaching the house, the trouble man rang the bell and when there was no response he gave the front door a slight shove. It opened and the odor of gas met his nostrils. He rushed in and found a girl seemingly sleeping, with an open book on her lap. Lifting her in his arms he rushed to the front porch where he applied artificial respiration. Then he dashed inside, flung the windows open, turned off the flood of gas escaping from a heater, and telephoned for an ambulance.

FLYING FISH SNAP TELEPHONE CABLES

Ocean City, N. J., Reports An Unusual Sight; Rain Is An Accessory
