PLAN PROTEST ON INCREASE OF RATES

Interest is manifested here in the movement started by North Shore communities at Winnetka last week to protest against the proposed increase of commutation rates by the Northwestern railroad, petition for permit for which has been filed with the state utilities commission. The general opinion seems to be that if rates are to be raised, the quality of the service should be improved in proportion.

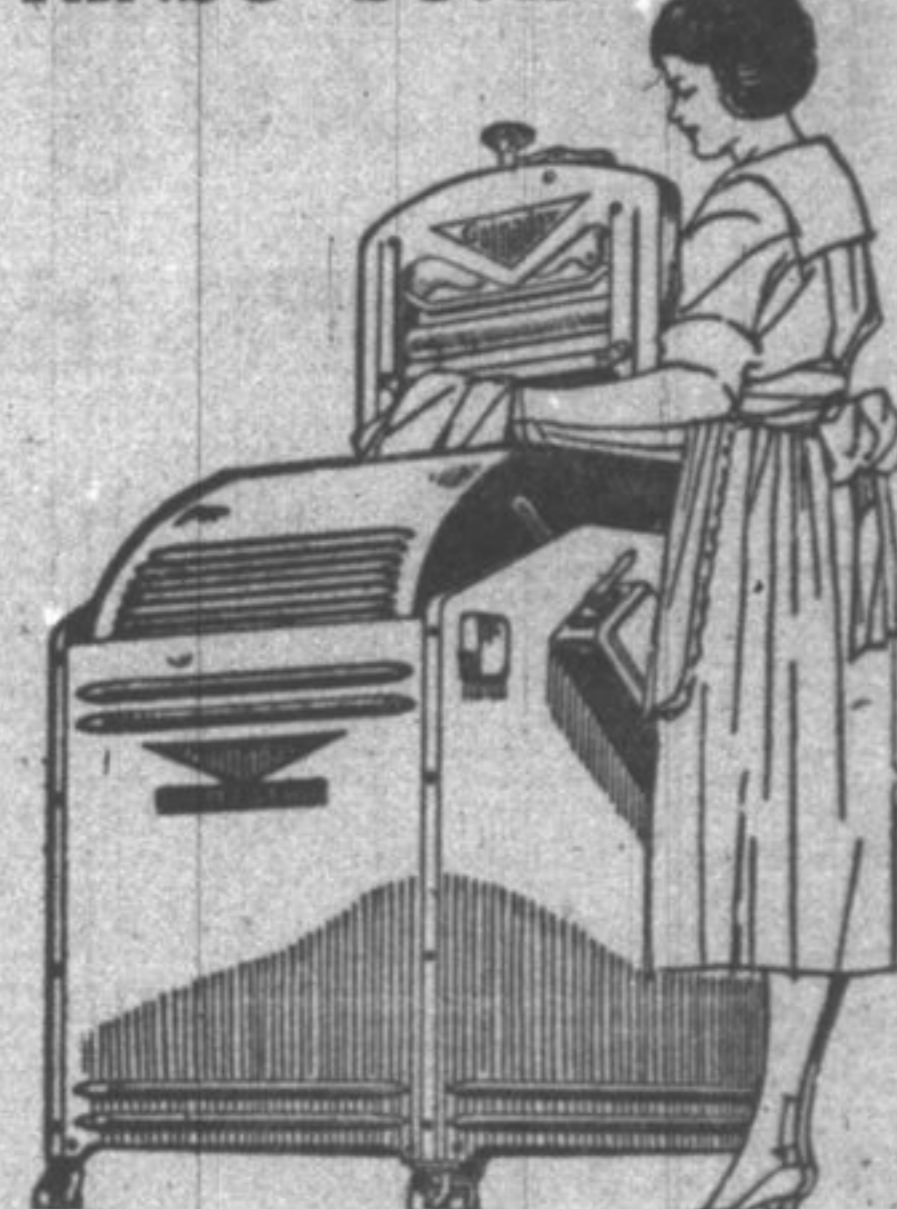
