Already the course is the favorite of many who have access to other clubs, and with the improvements scheduled for the coming season, we will have one of the most attractive municipal clubs in this section of the country.

The new nine holes will be ready for use in the early fall of 1925. All of the work of building the greens and fairways, except the seeding, has been finished. The new course will have a yardage of 6481 yards, with a par of 73.

The yardage for each hole is indicated on the plat of the course shown heron.

The construction of the new nine holes will not interfere with the use of the old nine.

In the completed eighteen hole course, the rough will be graded, making it possible to keep it cut with a tractor mower.

It is desirous to increase the membership this season, and the officers will appreciate early application for membership, thereby enabling the completion of the course at an early date. We invite your inspection of the grounds, knowing that you will be more than pleased and will look forward to many pleasant days of golf on these grounds during the coming season.

BOY SCOUT TROOPS AND THEIR DOINGS

Recent Activities of The Members of This Organization In This City

Saturday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock about eighteen boys of troop 2 left Elm Place school to hike to the Forest preserve south of the county line. A distance of a mile, beginning at Lincoln school, was measured and most of the boys passed the second class test in going scout pace (fifty steps running alternated with fifty steps walking). When the boys arrived at the preserve half of them made a trail for the other half to follow. When the second troop had trailed the first group a half mile the two parties united again and each boy built a fire. Several boys passed the second class test in fire making and taking care of a fire, but as the official requirement is that the boy start the fire with not more than two matches, those who had to use more failed. Then each boy cooked a quarter of a pound of meat and roasted two potatoes. Most of the boys passed this test in spite of Scoutmaster Gaidzik requiring them to eat what they cooked before they were considered to have passed the test. It was considered an exceptionally good hike by the boys and they are eagerly awaiting the next one.

In the meantime about eighteen boys from various troops met at the Lincoln school and marched to the Northwestern station where they met sixteen boys from troop 9 of Evanston. (Due to a mistake it was announced last week in the Press that these boys would be selected from several troops. The boys were picked from troop 9 which has about sixty seven members). Scoutmaster Ralph Baker and Assistant Scoutmaster Stephenson were in charge. The Evanston boys were entertained in the homes of members of troops 2, 3, and 4 for dinner.

At 7:00 o'clock the troops at Lincoln school and the boys from Evanston proceeded to demonstrate their ability in life saving, signaling, and firemaking. Eagle Scout Ward (of troop 9) was awarded a 100 per cent duty pin by Scoutmaster Baker and Scouts Lindsay (of troop 2) and Brainerd Chapman (of troop 3) were awarded 100 per cent duty pins by Mr. H. Ame Babcock. These pins were given for being the best all around scout in the troop. After the awards and exhibitions the boys drew up around the fire and sang several songs. Then popcorn, apples, and cider were passed around. After a few glasses the meeting was closed.

February 8 to 14 is Scout Week during which there will be a nationwide celebration of the fifteenth anniversary of the organization of The Boy Scouts of America. Further announcements of the local program for that week will be made in the next issue of the Press.
