## ANNUAL MEETING OF BLDG. & LOAN ASSN.

Three New Directors Chosen at Meeting Monday; Report Successful Year

The annual meeting of the Highland Park Building Loan and Home-Steal Association was held in the office of the association in the Highland Park State Bank Monday evening. About thirty-six hundred shares were present in person or by proxy.

Paul Gieser, Fred C. Noerenberg and Lyle Gourley were unanimously elected directors for three years.

President William Grant congratulated the shareholders on the close of another prosperous year, 1208 new shares being issued during the year; 301 matured and were paid off; 585 were withdrawn leaving 7,176 shares in force, held by 260 persons of whom 60 are borrowing members and 200 investors. The series just matured carried over eleven per cent.

The 149th series is now open and shares may be procured from the secretary, Charles F. Grant.

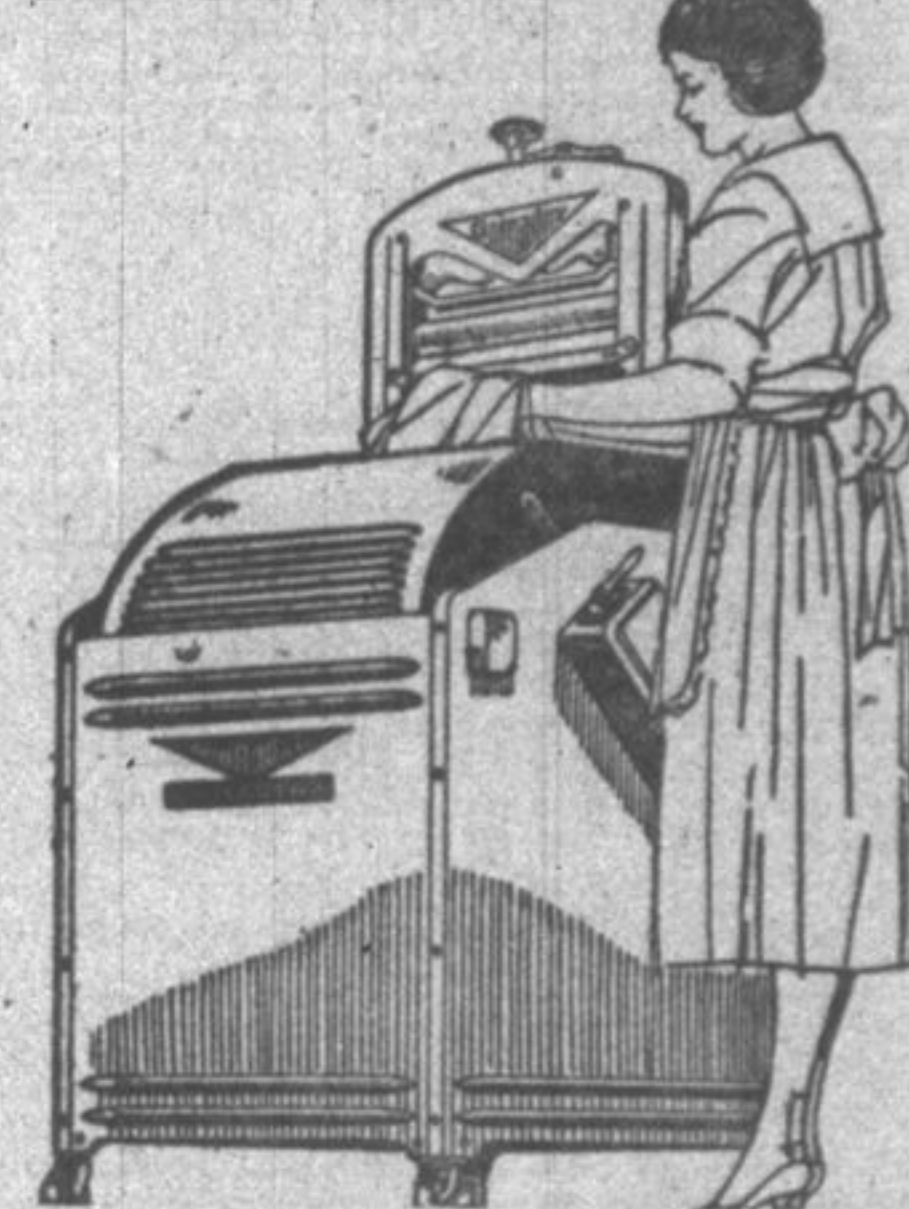
