

IDENTICAL panels with frames four feet high and eight feet long, constructed with sills and stude 7%x 3% in. and studs placed 16 in. on centers, were prepared. FRAME A had one side covered with %x6 in. dressed sheathing nailed at each stud with 8D nails, and the other side covered with common lath spaced 2 in. on centers and staggered in the usual way.

FRAME B was covered on both sides with Expanded Wood Lath sheets 8 ft. long and 16 in. wide, fastened at the juncture of each rib and stud with 5D nails. In testing these panels the bottom sill was clamped to the base of the testing machine and the pull applied to the top sill in the direction of its length.

One association in the southern end of the state offers a standing reward now of \$1,000 for a bank bandit, "dead or alive."

Patronage Machine Feared Former attempts to establish in Illinois a state constabulary modeled after the organizations of the eastern states have failed, largely it was said, because the downstate legislators were not interested.

The fear was that the proposed con stabulary was only another scheme to build up another patronage machine for the politicians at the expense of the taxpayers.

Added to this opposition was the strong antagonism of organized labor in the state. The labor leaders saw in the proposition a scheme to supplement the militia in times of strikes, particularly in the coal mining sections of the commonwealth.

Labor, it is understood, would not seriously oppose a constabulary, provided it is stated clearly in the law that the constabulary shall not be employed as a "strikebreaker."

Reports that have been received by proponents of the measure, however, indicate, on the face of things at least, that the rural communities, harassed by increased banditry since the building of the good roads, are not averse to giving the entire state a constabulary provided assurance can be given that it will not be made ar adjunct to some political machine.
