## BUSINESS MEN ALTER THEIR MEETING DATE

### WILL BE SECOND TUESDAY

#### Next Session to Be Held April 14, at Green Teapot; Proceedings of Meeting on Tuesday Night

Change of date of the monthly meeting of the Highland Park Business Men's association was made at the March session, held Tuesday evening in Witten hall. Hereafter meetings will be held on the evening of the second Tuesday of each month, instead of on the first Tuesday evening, as heretofore. The change is made to make it more convenient for business men to attend, as usually the first of the month finds them more than usually busy.

Next Meeting April 14  
The next session of the association will be held on Tuesday evening, April 14, at the Green Teapot, in the new Masonic Temple building, where dinner will be served at 7 o'clock to the members present. The regular business session will follow at 8:30 o'clock, Mrs. Green having consented to the holding of the meeting in the dining room.

At this session four new members were admitted to the rights and privileges of the association. The four are W. W. Thom, salesman; Tony Frauenhoffer, barber; Frank J. Zinov, commercial instructor at Deerfield-Shields high school, and the Sinclair Refining Co., represented by Messrs. Abel and Blocker.

Oppose Rate Increase  
The secretary, W. E. Becker, read to the forty members present a copy of a letter being sent by the association to the Chicago & Northwestern Railway company, protesting against the proposed increase in commutation rates and urging better service and more trains for Highland Park, which are greatly needed, general sentiment indicates.

It was also ordered that a communication be sent representatives in the state legislature from this district expressing opposition of the association to the proposed woman's eight-hour bill, now under consideration in the house.

Mr. Herman Denzel and Mr. Tolbert Daily, who recently returned from vacation trips in Florida, reported interesting and beneficial experiences.

## PROMISING YOUNG MAN PASSES AWAY

### Laurence V. Berube Dies on the Threshold of Career; Funeral Held

Death on Saturday, Feb. 28, removed a promising young man, Laurence V. Berube, aged 21, son of Joseph J. Berube, North Green Bay road. Laurence was 21 years of age. He obtained his education at the Immaculate Conception school and Deerfield high school and until recently was engaged in the insurance business. He was well known and highly esteemed and with every prospect of a highly successful career. He was a member of the Sacred Heart society, Lake Forest.

Laurence V. Berube was born in Highland Park, Nov. 13, 1903, and lived all his life here. He had many friends among the young people as evidenced by the large number who called at the home during his illness and death and also the large attendance at the funeral, held Tuesday morning, March 3, at Immaculate Conception church, the Rev. J. D. O'Neill officiating. Burial was in the North Shore cemetery beside the grave of his mother, who died Oct. 8, 1918, during the influenza epidemic of that year.

Besides the father there survive four brothers and two sisters—Julius J., George A., Burton W., James B., Ruth C. and Marie S. Berube.

This means that more or less additional business will be brought to the city by these visitors during their stay here.

## LECTURE BENEFITS FLAGSTAFF FUND

### HELD SATURDAY, MARCH 14

#### Charles C. Long to Speak on the National Capital, Elm Place School; under Auspices of D. A. R. Chapter

"Washington; Our National Shrine," will be the subject of an interesting address to be delivered by Charles Colfax Long Saturday afternoon and evening, March 14, in the Elm Place school auditorium. The proceeds will go to complete the fund being raised by the North Shore Chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution to replace the flagstaff on Central avenue, first erected by the chapter twenty-nine years ago. The lecture is given under the auspices of the chapter.

Timely Lecture  
This lecture is especially timely just now, following so soon after the inauguration of a president and vice-president, and because the vice-president is a North Shore neighbor, it is doubly so. Few people, comparatively, have had the privilege of attending inauguration ceremonies and visiting the many points of interest about the national capital, the white house, Lincoln memorial, Mount Vernon, Arlington and all the other beautiful spots and magnificent buildings in Washington, but all may have the opportunity of seeing these interesting features and hearing them described accurately and vividly by a master of the art of oratorical description, when Charles Colfax Long gives his address here March 14 on "Washington, Our National Shrine."

Interesting Speaker  
Mr. Long is an eloquent and interesting speaker. He knows Washington thoroughly and no one is better able to describe its beauties and point out its points of historical interest, so that his talks here promise to be of unusual value and an entertaining and profitable time is assured all who attend.

The efforts of the D. A. R. chapter to rehabilitate the flag pole are deserving of public support, and it is believed that because of the worthy character of the project and the special interest attaching to the lecture at this time the attendance will be large.

## HIGHWOOD DWELLING DESTROYED BY FIRE

### Ernest Knudson Home Burned Last Week; Fireman Injured; Loss Severe

Edward Wynock, fireman, was badly cut by falling glass during a fire which last Thursday afternoon destroyed the residence of Ernest Knudson, corner of Clay street and Glenview avenue, Highwood. The house was a large one, and the loss is estimated at from \$12,000 to \$15,000. The injured fireman was taken to the Fort Sheridan hospital, where the gash in his arm caused by falling glass when a window was blown out by the flames, was dressed, and he was able to leave the hospital Friday.

Mrs. Charles McGraw, whose family occupied part of the house burned, was ill and was carried from the burning building.

## ELM PLACE HOST TO TEACHERS OF COUNTY

### MEETING HERE TOMORROW

#### Prominent Educators and Zion Radio Stars on Program; Other Features; Open To Public

The Elm Place school tomorrow will be host to the Lake county Teachers association in its annual mid-year meeting, which will be held in this school both morning and afternoon. The sessions are open to the public and it is expected that many local people will take advantage of this opportunity to hear educational matters of general and local import discussed by leading educators.

Radio Stars on Program  
Among the entertainment features of the program will be violin solos by Mr. Richard F. Hre, well known radio star of the Zion station, and who will be accompanied by his mother, Mrs. L. J. Hre, also of the Zion station. Both these accomplished musicians are familiar performers to local radio listeners who will be glad of the chance to see them in this program. Mass singing will be in charge of G. J. Dinkelo, musical director at the Deerfield-Shields high school.

The first address on the program is to be delivered by Rev. E. Burns Martin, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Kenosha, and a minister of the gospel noted in our neighboring state as a pulpit and platform orator. Mr. Martin's subject will be "The Teacher and Good Looks."

Rotary Leader Speaker  
Allen G. Albert, editor of Paris, Ill., and prominent in the great International Rotary organization, will be another noted speaker on the morning program. His subject will be "Our New Social Philosophy." He will also speak in the afternoon on the topic, "New Methods of Education."

There will be an intermission for lunch, and those who plan to stay at the school are requested to bring their lunch, as provision cannot be made for so large a number, but arrangements have been made, according to the official announcement, for the serving of milk, tea, coffee and cocoa. Accommodations also will be afforded so that all may partake of their lunches in comfort.

This period will be made a pleasant and profitable one by Superintendent Jesse L. Smith and his corps of teachers. Opportunity will be given all to inspect this beautiful school building, and during the lunch hour the famous "Polhurst pictures," "Secrets of Life" will be shown.

Afternoon Program  
In the afternoon there will be more mass singing, and in addition to the address by Mr. Albert, Dr. Franklyn B. Snyder, head of the English department of Northwestern university will speak on the subject, "Standards of Value in Literature." This promises to be a literary treat for both teachers and the public.

Highland Park tomorrow will be the mecca for all the school teachers of the county and several hundreds of them are expected to attend this important mid-year session. County Supt. Arthur T. Simpson will be in charge of the convention.

## DEERFIELD QUINTET SEEK MORE TITLES

### SUBURBAN, AND DISTRICT

#### Heavies Win Class B and Play Waukegan for Championship; Meet La Grange Tonight

Deerfield Shields high school basketball team, winners of the Class B title in the Suburban league, have two strenuous weeks before them. This week-end the local heavies play in the state high school district tournament, and next week they will meet Waukegan, winners of the Class A championship in the Suburban league, for the grand championship of that league.

Deerfield Heavies clinched the Class B title last week, but were defeated Saturday by Bloem, 22 to 19. This, however did not change the Class B result. The local lights, however, also lost to Bloem, 24 to 10, and by this game lost the Class B title, taking second place in their class, with Thornton first.

To Play Waukegan  
The final championship game of the league between Waukegan and Deerfield will be played next week, but because of the preparations for the district tournament here, the date has not been definitely fixed, Coach Peel, manager of the district meet, reports.

Everything is in readiness for the second annual district tourney held here, which starts this afternoon in the high school gym. The first game will be between Waukegan and Des Plaines, at 2 o'clock. Deerfield's first game in the tourney is at 8 o'clock tonight, when the locals will clash with La Grange.

Promising Quintets  
The opening game probably will draw a big local crowd, as Deerfield fans are anxious to see Waukegan players perform in the tourney. The Evanston-Glen Ellyn game also is of interest, because Evanston is regarded as a strong contender for the district title, the done being that Deerfield, Evanston, Morton and Hinsdale are the four most promising teams in the tourney.

Indications are that attendance at the district tourney here today, tomorrow and Saturday will break the record set last year, when more than 3,000 attended. With Deerfield one of the strong contenders for the title this year, there is increased local interest in the meet, and with plenty of loyal support the Blue and White quintet will have a good chance to lead the meet, fans believe.

Sectional and State Meets  
The winner of the final game Saturday evening will represent this district in the sectional tournament to be played at Joliet March 13 and 14. Sectional games also will be held on the same dates at Peoria, Springfield and Centralia. The winners in these four sections will meet to battle for the state championship at the Illinois University gymnasium, Urbana, March 20 and 21. Elgin, winner of last year's state title, plays in the sectional meet at Joliet and is again a strong competitor for the state title, it is reported.

Outlook Promising  
With the district tourney over, Deerfield team, win or lose this title, will have to meet Waukegan on a neutral floor next week to play for the Suburban title, win or lose in the district meet, the Deerfield quintet will be in form for the clash with Waukegan for the suburban title. This promises to be a battle royal, and it is expected that a large number of Deerfield supporters will accompany the team. Should they go through to win in the district tourney, Deerfield and Shields township will be well represented at the sectional tourney at Joliet March 13 and 14.
