CHILDREN'S ROOM IN ART INSTITUTE

Opened Recently with Exhibition of Dolls; Collection is Varied

The Children's room in the Art Institute was opened Thursday February 12, with an exhibition of dolls.

A set of Japanese dolls, arranged for the Hina-Matsuri or Girls' Festival, contains beautiful examples of 18th century doll manufacture.

The heads and hands are exquisitely modelled, and the costumes made of rich brocades, are perfect to the last detail.

A collection of Chinese Shadow Puppets present the actor-doll. The shadow plays of the east have been popular for centuries, and those of China are perhaps the most beautiful and interesting.

The fine old puppets of which there are four in this collection; were made of buffalo hide, scraped thin enough to be transparent, cut in delicate design and highly colored.

During the performance, the showman sits on the ground holding the puppets above his head on long bamboo rods before a white screen, on which the shadows are thrown by a brilliant light behind him.

As he moves the figures, he recites the story of the play, directs the musicians, and makes noises with his feet to indicate the tramping of the actors.

Costume dolls, whose business it is to display dresses, as do the mannequins in the best shops, character dolls representing celebrities of the screen and stage, dolls from the Orient, from Spain, old fashioned ladies from Philadelphia and Boston and the buckskin paposes of little Indian girls, are all in this exhibition.

COOLIDGE AIMING AT RED TAPE PEST

Economy Program Likely to End in Elimination of Much Dead Wood

Those who are in touch with President Coolidge and who have an insight into his ideas, hint that in his constant and insistent demands for a reduction in government expenditures he has a larger and bigger motive than the mere saving of dollars.

Harking back to his experience when as Governor of Massachusetts he eliminated half of the state commissions and their office holding staffs and by the act improved the public service, it is whispered that he is ambitious to try the same experiment in Washington. It must be admitted that there is room for improvement in this great nest of officials.

There are departments, bureaus and divisions where the office holders fairly sit on one another, and where public business is delayed because of the lost motions which the employment of a surplus of chiefs naturally imposes.

It is also a matter of public comment, that in the overmanned departments the general attitude displayed towards the public, is out of kilter with what should be evident in a public office. It is said that in some of the divisions, which might be named, one requires an official guide to discover the identity of the chiefs and a lawyer to present the case when that person is found.

That is what Calvin Coolidge is driving against, that is what he is trying to root out. He believes the taxpayer has a right to approach a chief without a guide, interpreter or lawyer and to secure a settlement at first hand.

In the naming of his new cabinet officers it will not be surprising if the ability of the candidates to cut red tape, to stand unmoved and unafraid before governmental routine and office holding, would be the determining factor in the mind of the President in making his selection.

LEAP YEAR BOOSTS COST OF RELIEF

The extra day which Leap year gave to the world last year was an expensive luxury for the Near East Relief, according to the annual financial report just prepared by the overseas directors of the organization.

The report states that Feb. 29th cost about \$15,000, "because refugees and orphans had to be fed and cared for on Feb. 29th the same as any other day." So February 29th is revealed as a thief; instead of twenty-four hours gained, it meant to a big orphanage organization just so much added expense.
