## MRS. COOLIDGE OPENS WOMAN'S WORLD'S FAIR

Y. W. C. A. to Participate in Exhibit April 18-25 in Chicago

Milestone in the progress of the Young Women's Christian Association since its organization in 1855 are to be indicated by the National Board of the Y. W. C. A. co-operating with the Y. W. C. A. of Chicago, at the Woman's World Fair, which is to be opened by Mrs. Calvin Coolidge April 18th in Chicago. President Coolidge will precede the event with a radio address, following which Mrs. Coolidge is to press the electric button which is to formally open the fair at the American Exposition Palace.

Achievement of woman, including her present status in business, trades, professions and arts, as well as her development in social, civic and club organizations, will be revealed, not only in terms of this country, but of the far places of the earth. Merchants, manufacturers, and growers of the products which relate to women will offer displays. Two hundred and seventy-five booths will cover every phase of woman's activities and interests. The Y. W. C. A. has chosen as its method of portrayal a carefully executed series of charts, chronologically arranged and introducing many humorous and human features of its growth.

The Woman's World's Fair is under the management of a board of directors consisting of Mrs. Joseph T. Bowen, Mrs. Joseph G. Coleman, Mrs. George R. Dean, Mrs. Howard Linn, Mrs. Rockefeller McCormick, Mrs. Medill McCormick, Mrs. Frederick Rawson, Mrs. T. W. Robinson, Mrs. Silas H. Strawn, and Miss Helen M. Bennett, who is the originator of the idea.

Features of entertainment will be included in the program by prominent women artists for the enjoyment of those in attendance. The fair will continue from April 18 to 25, during which time a number of distinguished women are to be guests of the fair's management.

Indiana Artists to Display Works at Marshall-Fields. Prizes to be Awarded

The Daughters of Indiana assisted by the Chicago Earlham Alumni and members of the Indiana society, will hold a Hoosier Salon in the Marshall Field Art Galleries March 9th to the 19th, 1926, in which only the works of art consisting of oils, water colors, pastels, etchings, miniatures, drawings and cartoons of Indiana artists will be exhibited.

It promises to be unique as never before has there been held a single state exhibition of pictures, and a fine jury of capable men including the names listed below, insure just and impartial judgment. Defrees, president Chamber of Commerce of the United States, 1920-21.

## GRAND JURY MAKES NEW SPEED RECORD

Completes Work in Day; Four Charged with Murder in Train Holdup

Four were indicted for murder, and seven others were hit in true bills returned by the grand jury late Monday afternoon, a new record for speed having been made by a Lake county grand jury.

Bernard Mylin, Bernard Smith, both of Milwaukee, Ralph Norris-McKee, and Edward Smith, both of Chicago, the latter a policeman, were indicted for the murder of Russell Sage Dickey, express messenger on the "Viking Express" of the Chicago and Northwestern railroad, who was shot to death when an effort was made to rob the express car of \$200,000 near Highland Park, on the night of Dec. 30.

It is alleged that Mylin fired the two shots that killed Dickey. Indictments for robbery and larceny were also returned against the quartet. Other indictments were for minor offenses, mostly.

## PLAYGROUNDS WON BY LEGION WORK

Two South Carolina Cities Get Them Through Efforts of Veterans

At least two South Carolina cities Marion and Dillon, have been awarded Harmon Foundation playgrounds through the instrumentality of their local American Legion posts.

Announcement of the playground awards was made to post officials who have been working for the gifts ever since the Harmon Foundation published notice about a year ago that 50 awards would be made to qualified cities. More than a thousand applications were made from all parts of the United States. Through the efforts of the Legion posts the South Carolina cities qualified and have been kept in the running through the series of elimination.

The playground project is only one movement in the full program of child welfare which the Legion has undertaken. A considerable portion of the income from the recently launched American Legion \$5,000,000 Endowment Fund project will be given over to the care and education of the orphaned children of the World War.

Motorman Simpson Killed Morning When Cars Collide; Frank Hit by Auto

Two fatal accidents in this city and vicinity were reported last night. Fatal Auto Accident Frank Stupey, a well-known resident of Highland Park, died last Thursday afternoon in an accident which occurred at 10 o'clock that morning, on the intersection of Highland Park, avenue, Highwood, where his home.

According to testimony given at the inquest, Stupey was standing on the sidewalk when a truck was driven by William Goring, failing to notice that Frank Stupey was in the way. Goring swerved his car in an effort to avoid striking Stupey, but failed, stopping within twenty feet of the point where Stupey was taken to the Highland Park hospital. It was found that he had fractures of the right leg, ankle and the right arm, shoulder, besides other injuries. He died in about four hours after the accident, and Mr. Goring was charged with blame in the accident.

Relatives Living Mr. Stupey was born in Highland Park and lived in this vicinity. Two sons and a daughter, Robert and David Stupey, and Mrs. Pearl Curson of Another son, Walter, was seen while serving in the army. Other near relatives are living brothers and sisters: Waukegan; Peter and John Highwood, and Mrs. Ellis Well, San Mateo, Calif.

The funeral was held Monday at Highland Park, where Stupey was in the North Shore cemetery.
