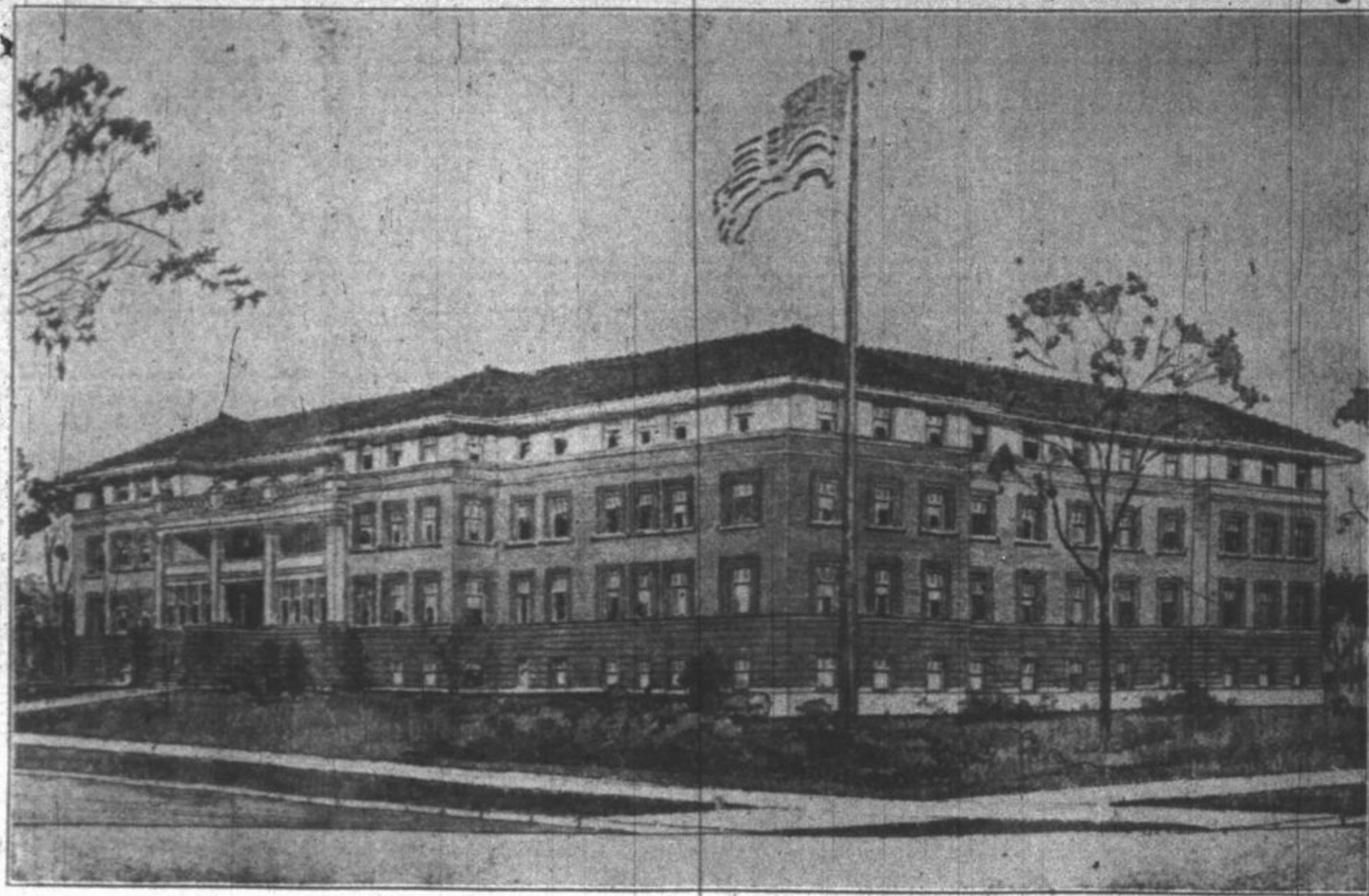

### JAPANESE ATHLETE LEARNS BOXING

#### JUJITSU VS. KNOCKOUT

#### Argument as to Respective Merits of American and Jap Methods Is Settled Effectively

Members of Tokyo-Yokohama Post of The American Legion, have introduced much that is American in the land of the cherry blossom and jujitsu—including the right cross to the jaw.

At a dinner given in Tokyo recently attended by General Ugaki, Japanese Minister of War, and Captain "C", Attache of the American Embassy and a member of Tokyo Post of The Legion, the relative merits of "Jujitsu" and boxing as a means of self-defense were discussed. The consensus of Japanese opinion, after witnessing a boxing match between Captain "C" and Jack Tynan of the Tokyo Post, was that boxing as a means of self-defense would not be of much use against the Japanese art of Judo, familiarly known as Jujitsu.

To settle the argument, the minister of War suggested that a match be arranged between Captain "C" and the instructor of Jujitsu at a Japanese military academy. Captain "C" explained that the purposes of the two arts were different and could not be well compared, but his hesitancy was interpreted to mean that he recognized Jujitsu as the superior art. The Japanese insisted on the match—so it was arranged.

The Judo expert was the same weight as Captain "C", 170 pounds. The Japanese had taken the precaution to witness several boxing matches to know what to expect. The Captain knew only what he had heard of the cunning and cruel Judo art.

The two faced each other. Captain "C" flinched with his left hand. A brown hand flashed out and the white man's left wrist was gripped in an unrelenting vise. Then, by the hold known as the "flying mare," the wrist was twisted until the body of the white man was brought to the leverage, where with a quick jerk and heave it was thrown over the Jap's shoulder to the floor.

Smiled too Soon  
Loud applause greeted this result and the smiling Japanese bowed to the audience. He smiled at the Captain, which was a foolish thing to do.

Again the two faced each other. Again the Captain flinched with his left, but with the speed of a snake's darting tongue he smacked home a crashing right cross to the Jap's jaw. The Judo expert took the count—in the usual way.

When the Japanese was revived the Captain remarked that as each had scored one "fall" they had better have another to settle it. The Japanese shook his head and was led to the dressing room.

Boxing has been added to the curriculum of Japanese military academies.

Instead of finding an increasing appetite among citizens in general for red issues and arguments they declare sadly that some of their converts are beginning to backslide. Emma Goldman is now in London lecturing to the Bourgeois on the crimes of bolshevism, and a current newspaper report has it that Big Bill Haywood who fled America to make Democracy safe in Russia is either in America, or is trying to get into this country, for the purpose of serving his term in a federal prison hoping that on the completion of his sentence, he will be allowed to remain here.

One of their leading newspaper exponents recently wailed editorially to the extent of a column or more, that as matters stood it looked as if it would be ten years or more before they could hope to raise the red banner again with any hopes of success in the United States. There are not many of our decent citizens who will express any particular regret or sorrow over this disclosure. The parlor bolsheviks have been slow in realizing that the majority of us appreciated after reading the returns of the last election that we are a steadfast conservative people.

A country where saving bank deposits in ten years increased from eight to twenty-one billions of dollars, and where the total of life insurance policies in the same period increased from fifteen to fifty-seven billions of dollars can be considered as reasonably conservative. This is not saying that there is not work yet to be done in every newspaper in driving these facts home on their readers, but happily our Bolshevist problem is still confined to the prevention rather than the cure of the disease in this country.

### GREEK PATRIARCH SENDS BLESSINGS

#### Persecuted Priest of Orthodox Church Thanks Near East Relief

Constantinos VI., the persecuted Patriarch of the Greek Orthodox church, whose expulsion from Constantinople last month aroused the interest of the whole civilized world and threatened for a time to precipitate war between Greece and Turkey, has sent his formal blessing and benediction to the officers and members of the Near East Relief organization in America.

A parchment roll, bearing the seals of the Holy Synod and the elaborate fourteen-inch signature of the Patriarch, has been dispatched to New York, bearing the following official message:

"To officers and members of the Near East Relief: May grace and peace from God be with you. A formal meeting of the Holy Synod takes occasion to express once again the merited praise and admiration which our church feels toward your great work. The philanthropic heart of America is manifested and typified in the enterprises which you have undertaken in these times of great catastrophe for our people. Our appreciation is heartfelt. May the Lord bless your great, land and may His benediction rest upon its noble people. May He strengthen and reward all those who have taken part in these deeds of international neighborliness. ### ST. PAUL CATHEDRAL REPAIRS DISCUSSED

#### LITTLE CAUSE FOR ALARM

#### Lord Mayor of London Thinks It Can Be Done Easily Without Closing Famous Edifice

"The new mystery of St. Paul's" is a lively topic of British interest today, following the action by the city corporation in condemning the historic cathedral as unsafe and rejecting the repairs scheme of the church authorities—the only alternative to which would seem to be a comprehensive drastic scheme of repairs costing perhaps £500,000 and likely to render the edifice more or less unavailable for church purposes over a long period of years.

The doubts and questions naturally arising from this unexpected and "unprecedented" development have been further intensified by the refusals by municipal and church authorities alike to furnish comment or explanation.

In Need of Attention  
That the cathedral for years has been in need of attention is quite generally recognized and the church authorities have from time to time been proceeding with the repairs. Anxiety centers mainly on the supports for the dome, which are hollow pillars filled with rubble. In the case of two out of eight of these they have been strengthened by injecting liquid cement to fill the space.

A commission of experts, headed by Sir Aston Webb, who spent three years investigating the problem for the church authorities from every angle, and are regarded with the utmost confidence, had come to the conclusion that the grouting of the piers, combined with repairs to the stone work, would, if carefully and immediately attended to—and at a cost of only £140,000—meet the case for this generation at least.

Now—for reasons not yet entirely explained—the city authorities demand a complete change of procedure, involving, it is apprehended, the construction of a dome and supporting piers. All inquiries to elicit further information have been unanswered. Canon S. A. Alexander, treasurer of the cathedral fund, refused to say anything, as did Dean Inge and Mervyn Macartney, the cathedral architect. Similar reticence is maintained by officials of the city corporation.

No Cause for Alarm  
Sir Alfred Bower, Lord Mayor, who is by virtue of his official position, a joint trustee of the cathedral along with the Archbishop of Canterbury and Bishop of London, was, however, most reassuring in the statements to the London press last night. He said there was no need for alarm so far as the safety of the public was concerned, and gave it as his opinion that the necessary repairs could be carried out without closing the building.

### UNEMPLOYMENT AND EDUCATION PROGRESS

Unemployment in Great Britain reacted in many ways on the educational system of the nation. The annual report of the London County Council for 1923, recently received by the bureau of education of the Interior Department, states that pupils in the schools were kept under strict supervision and special arrangements were made for undernourished children, either by meals furnished at school or in the way of family relief. On the other hand, the unemployment situation caused many schools to extend their playgrounds and to modernize and enlarge their school plants. This was done under the unemployment relief scheme.

### NEW WAR METHODS WORST, SAYS WRITER

#### Declares There is Nothing So Bad as Corruption of the Best

Speaking of the Black Army of France, Doctor Albert Guerard, of the University of California, says in the March Scribner's Magazine:  
"How glibly we are all talking now about the next war! Our admirals and generals win applause when they say: 'We believe that the next war should be averted in the same way as all previous wars have been averted, by preparing for it.' Is there no way out? The French would say, as Alphonse Karr remarked when it was proposed to abolish capital punishment: 'Que Messieurs les Assassins commentent!'"

"If war should come, we do not shudder at the thought of the most cultured population in Europe being submitted to the tyranny of African savages. War is Hell; but Hell can be made much more efficiently hellish by bespectacled doctors of philosophy, just as Professor Wendt can get in his electric oven a temperature higher than that of any star. When it comes to atrocities, the supremacy of the Caucasian, and particularly of the Nordic, is beyond challenge. A London caddy thought he would blast with his vituperations his mild and scholarly-looking 'fare,' but the little Professor was a philologist, who gave him there and then a cursory treatise on the art of swearing. In the same way, the champion cannibal from the South Seas is a tyro compared with a specialist from Essen. Or, to put the same thought in more courteous and more classical language, 'there is nothing worse than the corruption of the best.'"

### FORMER RESIDENT IS PROMINENT ASTRONOMER

#### Dr. Pease of Mt. Wilson Discovers Mira, Second Largest Star in Universe

The following is a clipping from the Los Angeles Times of March 9th, showing the achievement of Dr. Francis G. Pease of Mt. Wilson Observatory. Dr. Pease is a former Highland Park resident.

Pasadena, March 9.—Announcement that the variable star Mira, a faint speck in the sky 165 light-years away, probably is the second largest known star in the universe was made at Mount Wilson Observatory today.

The astonishing discovery that Mira is 250,000,000 miles in diameter and is thus 25 per cent largest than Betelgeuse, the big star of the constellation Orion, was made by Dr. Francis G. Pease of the observatory staff, using the 100-inch reflecting telescope in connection with a twenty-foot Michelson interferometer.

Betelgeuse was measured successfully four years ago and was then believed to be the second largest star. The largest star known is Antares, which has a diameter of 400,000,000 miles.

Mira was discovered by David Fabricius in 1596, who gave it the name by which it is known, measuring most wonderful because of the remarkable changes in the intensity of its light. At its brightest Mira gives off 200 per cent more illumination than at its dimmest. It is red in color and the light cycle occupies eleven months.

The density of Mira is believed to be very low and it may be entirely composed of gases. It moves very swiftly through the sky, at a rate that has been computed at 100 miles a second.

The details of Dr. Pease's discovery will be sent to Washington, where the main offices of the Carnegie Solar Observatory are located.

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
