SPRING CLEAN-UP BEGINS ON MONDAY

CITY WILL HAUL RUBBISH

Householders Asked to Place all Rubbish on the Parkways; Districts and Days of Hauling

Annual Clean-up Week in Highland Park is all next week, according to a proclamation of Acting Mayor Frank L. Cheney, and all citizens are urged to co-operate with the city officials in a general spring cleaning of their premises.

It is to the advantage of property-owners and householders to do this, as the city has made arrangements to have certain kinds of rubbish hauled away without cost to the property owners or tenants, provided the rubbish is collected and placed in receptacles along the parkways. No ashes will be hauled by the city trucks or teams, and the city workmen will not go into basements or collect the material, all of which must be in boxes, barrels, or other receptacles and placed on the parkways.

Firemen Answer 27 Calls Since April First; 11 in 3 Hours

The Highland Park fire department has been "run ragged" this week with calls to extinguish grass and woodfires. Since April 1 there have been 27 alarms, all for this type of fire, and the fire fighters have been kept busy.

On Tuesday in a space of three hours the department answered eleven calls, and in two or three instances they had a hard time keeping the blaze from extending to neighboring outbuildings and garages, lumber piles and even in some cases houses were in danger. However, thanks to prompt action of the firemen, no serious damage was done in any case, and the community owes them its appreciation for their efforts.

Citizens are urged to be more careful in burning grass and rubbish while everything is so dry. There have been as yet none of the spring rains at this season, and grass and weeds are dry and inflammable, so that it is difficult to halt a fire when once it spreads to sections where these are abundant.
