To Be Held April 18 in Chapel of College; Fine Artists On Program

The school of Music has made it a custom to present each year at least one younger artist whose reputation is still in the making. In the last concert of this season on the evening of April 18, Florence Grosse, soprano, will share the program with Marta Milinowski, pianist, Isaac Van Grove, well known as coach for the stars of the Civic Opera company, and inimitable as an accompanist, is doing his pupil the honor of acting as her accompanist on this occasion.

Florence Grosse, who is only nineteen years old and reaches F above high C with the ease of a bird, began her studies with Vittorio Trevisan in Chicago. Upon the advice of notable operatic stars for whom she sang she went to Europe where she enjoyed the teaching of Jean de Reszke in Paris and of Giuseppe DeLuca in Milan, remaining there for two years to gain valuable experience by singing in various opera houses. Returning to New York her studies continued under Riccardo Dillaro of the Metropolitan Opera company, after which she became the pupil of Isaac Van Grove who is now preparing her for an operatic career, believing that a brilliant future is in store for this young artist.
