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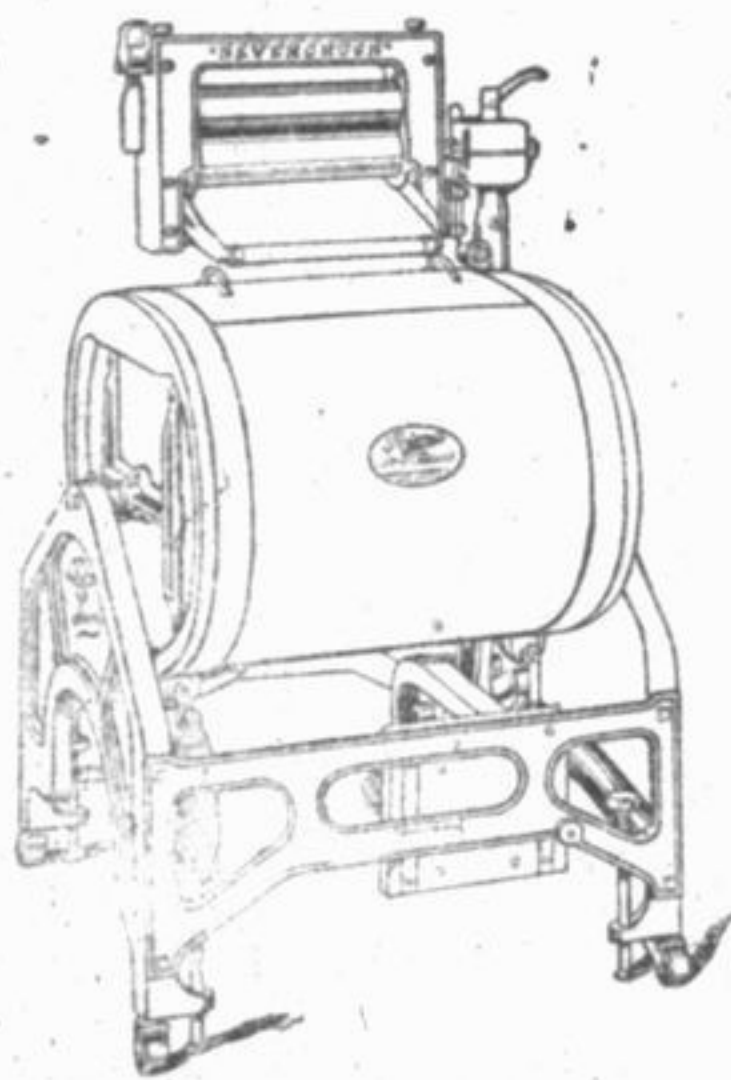

Horace J. Bridges Gives Interesting
Talk to Highland
Park Women

At an open meeting of the Highland Park Woman's club Tuesday afternoon, Mr. Horace J. Bridges spoke on "Great Britain's Contribution to American Civilization."

Mr. Bridges described American civilization as "an experiment in grafting a number of cultural elements upon a common stem." The blending of races produces great nations and Mr. Bridges feels that America in this has a great advantage, as all nations are contributing toward American civilization.

England's contributions, he stated, are of the greatest importance. In the first place, the English language is our language; second, the English law is the base upon which our laws have been written; third, England and America, to a great extent, have a common history; and last, the literature of the two nations is closely related.
