The work of preserving the ravines intact is fundamental. Fundamental things must be done before we can think of statuary and other works of man belonging to the fine arts. The ravines themselves are a work of the fine arts and should be kept forever as such.

A concerted effort should be organized against this destructive work. and all filling for street crossings taken out and bridges put in its place.
