Urges Bridges Over Ravines, Opposes Fills

The following letter from Jens Jensen, noted landscape architect, is of especial interest to Highland Park people:

March 30, 1925.

 Gentlemen:

At a public meeting held last week in the Ravinia school, I spoke about the filling in of certain ravines for road construction, in place of building bridges. I would like to make my remarks known to a greater audience and ask you to be good enough to print this letter.

The North Shore country, especially north of Winnetka is typical for its deep ravines. It is a distinctive bit of native landscape and as such, it has great economic as well as aesthetic value. The closer we can come to weaving our lives into this bit of native landscape, the nearer we will come to a finer and a more normal life.

There should, therefore, be a definite policy for all physical work established toward this end. To me, it is criminal to fill in any part of our ravines. They are and always will remain distinctive arteries or ribbons of parks with a flora indigenous to our region. The filling in of any part of them destroys their continuity, takes away the romance and beauty that bridges give them, and makes the road picture commonplace with any other road picture on level land. The thrill of passing over a bridge and the interest in looking down into the depths of a ravine with its mosaic of leaves or running water, or, at this time of the year, carpets of thousands of Trilliums and Hepaticas in bloom, will be a loss to ourselves as well as to our visitors. We have no such thrill or beauty anywhere in the prairie country of Illinois, except from an aeroplane.

Bridges help to give the ravine country character, as it is being built up, and beauty too. It is a serious thing for our North Shore towns, this filling in of our ravines, as it destroys their greatest asset, and I am wondering that this is permitted by the citizenry. There must be some who see the folly of such improvement. Where are woman's clubs that usually are awake to matters of aesthetic nature? And the new North Shore Art society? The work of preserving fundamental things must be done before we can think of statuary and other works of man belonging to the fine arts. The ravines themselves are a work of the fine arts and should be kept forever as such.

A concerted effort should be organized against this destructive work, and all filling for street crossings taken out and bridges put in its place. If we cannot afford concrete bridges, wooden bridges can be built. They are far prettier than the average concrete bridge I have seen and eventually we can afford stone, which is superior to anything else and will last for thousands of years.

Keep our ravines open. Have some regard for those who follow us and do not destroy the native beauty that once begged you away from the great city or other parts of the country.


