DELINQUENT INCOME TAX PAYERS WARNED

Should Report to Office of Collector Before They Are Prosecuted

Income tax delinquents in the First Illinois district who are innocent of fraudulent intent will save themselves considerable trouble if they report to the office of Mrs. Mabel G. Reinecke before May 1. Mrs. Reinecke announced last week that she is preparing for a "drive" to round up delinquents beginning about May 1 and that all such who have failed intentionally to report their earnings for 1924 will be subject to prosecution for fraud.

"Doubtless many of those who owe the government a tax and failed to file their returns at the expiration of the period for filing on March 16 are innocent of any fraudulent intent," she said. "They can best show this by coming in voluntarily before we start out after them. In that case they pay the 23 per cent penalty in addition to their tax and the matter will be ended. Those who fail to report, however, will be considered as willful evaders and prosecutions will follow unless they can show that they intended no fraud. The burden of proof will be upon them so far as the starting of proceedings is concerned."

Mrs. Reinecke says that the check up so far made shows that the number of delinquents is not any larger than usual this year. Still there are several hundred persons who are delinquent. It will please us immensely if they come in before the end of the month.

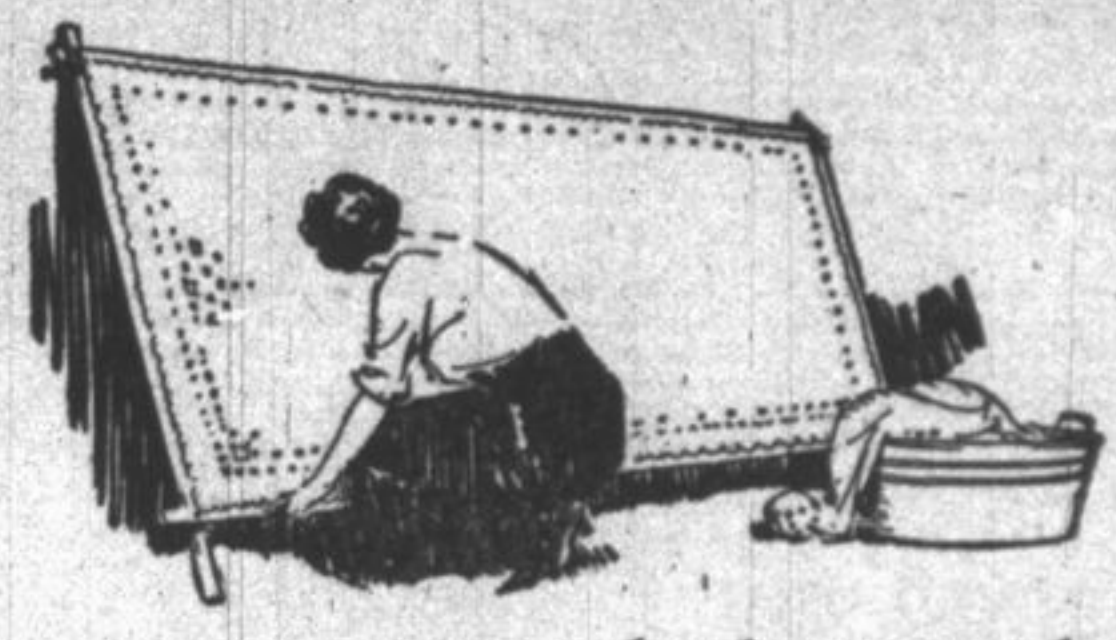
