No more cases of small-pox have occurred and danger from the two previously reported cases is nearly

It cannot be too strongly emphasized however that the one sure preventative of small-pox is vaccination. Contagious cases reported the past week: whooping cough, 2; chicken pex, 5; mumps, 3; measles, 2.
