### CIVIC MUSIC ASS'N. FACES DEFICIT 1924-25

Itemized Account of Condition Given; Cost Greater than Last Year

Now that the series of concerts sponsored by the Civic Music association of Highland Park is finished it might be of interest to the subscribers and friends of this movement to know in detail the cost of bringing to this city attractions of such high standard. Owing to the advanced rates of the Musicians Union, the committee found itself in a difficult situation. Whereas last year the cost of two concerts by the Little Symphony was \$500, this year the cost of one concert was \$425. The committee charged the low rate of \$2.50 for the season ticket, hoping for an increased list of subscribers. Thanks are due the committee representing the Civic Lecture Series of 1923-1924 for financial aid. Thanks are also due other individual donors. It is indeed to be regretted that the lack of general support makes it necessary to call upon the guarantors to meet the deficit.

Hence they believe him to be the robber.

### C. L. HENDRICKS DIES AT HIS HOME HERE

Founder of Merchants Reserve Life Ins. Co. Passes Away; Funeral April 11

Charles L. Hendricks, founder of the Merchants Reserve Life Insurance company, died Thursday, April 9, at his home, 2025 South St. Johns avenue, Highland Park. Heart disease aggravated by a fall a week previously led to death.

Mr. Hendricks was born in Chicago sixty years ago. He was head of the Hendricks Finance company and was prominent in real estate and insurance circles.

He is survived by a widow, Mrs. Elizabeth Hendricks, two sons, Charles V. and C. Leonard Hendricks; and a daughter, Mrs. Nathaniel Borquest.

Funeral services were held at Graecland cemetery chapel Saturday, April 11, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon.

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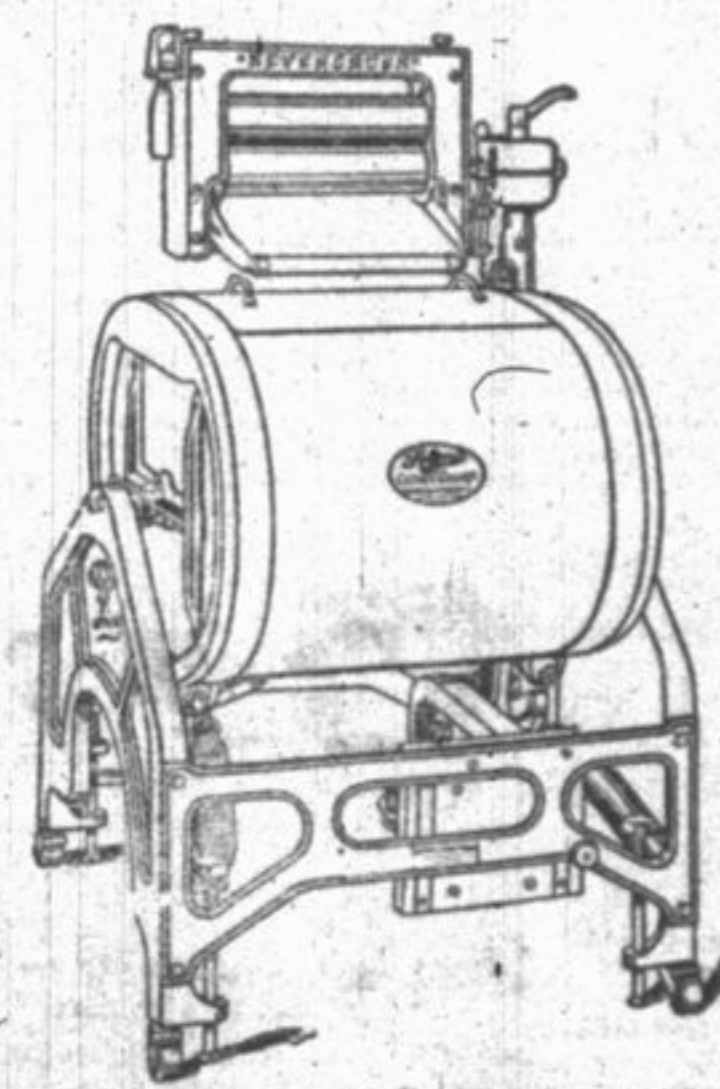
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
