**CONGRESS PROVIDES FOR VETERANS' CARE**  
**APPROPRIATIONS LARGE**  
**Extensive Relief is Given and Provision for Assistance in Many Lines; Legion Gives Support**  
 Appropriations and grants of relief totaling \$426,987,750 for the benefit of World War veterans, particularly for the disabled, were made by the recent session of congress, according to a report received at national headquarters of the American Legion from John Thomas Taylor, chairman of the Legion's national legislative committee. The Legion supported this legislation.  
**Amounts Shown**  
 For the operations of the United States Veterans' Bureau an appropriation of \$405,700,000 was obtained. For additional hospital construction \$10,000,000 was appropriated. For enlargements and alterations in various Veterans' bureau hospitals, in the hospital at the National Home for Disabled Volunteer Soldiers at Santa Monica, California, and in Walter Reed hospital at Washington, D. C., \$7,487,750 was made available.  
 Under the Johnson bill, compensation will be paid to some 5,000 veterans who have been denied it on the grounds of wilful misconduct. This is expected to benefit them to the extent of \$2,000,000 annually.  
 Veterans were relieved of repayment on overpayments on "Class E" allotments made during the war. Overpayments totaled \$1,800,000. These allotments were made out to wife, mother or children. In many

cases the overpayments represent duplicate payments to wife and mother. Refund to veterans on federal irrigation projects were authorized.  
**Legion Support**  
 The Legion supported the appropriations for the various branches of the national defense. Appropriations made were: Army, \$331,000,000; navy, \$400,000,000; national guard, \$32,938,546; aviation, \$35,750,000; civilian military training camps, \$2,807,471; officers' reserve corps, \$3,142,800.  
 Largely as a result of Legion efforts, the appropriations for the civilian military training camps and the officers' reserve corps were increased beyond the budget recommendations and beyond the 1924 appropriations. The increase over the budget recommendation for the former was \$487,471, and for the latter, \$452,334. In each case a decrease over the preceding year had been recommended by the bureau of the budget.  
 By March 7 there had been 2,300,000 applications for adjusted compensation, or sixty-five per cent of those eligible. Early in the month the Veterans' bureau mailed 68,000 checks totaling \$2,272,000 to veterans and dependents of veterans in cases where the individual payment was less than \$50.


