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### BANKERS UNITING IN WAR ON CRIME

#### THIEVERY IS WIDESPREAD

See Hope, However, in That Belief Is That Most Folks Are Inherently Honest; List Of Robberies

The average person has but a faint idea of how much thievery there is going on every day of the year, says the Illinois Bankers association, now in the midst of a vast, statewide campaign to blast robbery out of Illinois.—not bank robbery alone but all sorts of thievery, from the wanton who cleans the heh roost to the yegg who blows the bank safe.

Since they have gotten thoroughly into the study of crime and the cure officials of the Illinois Bankers association are convinced that thievery, robbery, stealing, whatever you will, is a disease and a mania.

"Were it not for the fact that every one is inherently honest, the picture of crime as it pertains to the category of robbery would be most morbid, indeed," says M. A. Graettinger, secretary of the association.

**Steal Church Piano**

Meetings in every county, where the town guard system is being instituted by the association throughout Illinois, are regaled with the story, humorous but pitifully true, about the vandals who stole the piano out of the church down at Tuscola, Ill. By dint of chicken pie suppers, quilting bees and personal contributions, the Ladies' Aid society finally secured enough money to buy a new piano. But the day the new instrument was installed a committee from the society went to the hardware store and purchased a heavy chain and a padlock with which the piano was fastened to the floor.

The Illinois Chamber of Commerce has compiled a list of persons in the state, towns, alphabetized, who have been held up, robbed, threatened with death by thugs, shot, had their property damaged by thieves and who have otherwise suffered indignities at the hands of criminals.

### OPPORTUNITY FIRST FOR U. S. CITIZENS

#### President Emphasizes This In Talk on Immigration at D. A. R. Congress

The thought that the people already in the United States, native and foreign born, citizens and aliens, have a first right to an opportunity to make a living and secure a foot hold here as against a new immigration, was one of the big things which the President drove home in his address to the Daughters of the American Revolution.

Speaking of the new immigration law, he called the attention of his audience to the fact that but for this law we would, in the last four years, have received an additional eight millions of people from Europe, all competing against the people already here in the battle for a livelihood.

Inasmuch as many of them, by reason of the straitened conditions in which they would reach us, would by force of circumstances, be ready to accept any wage offered for the purpose of securing bread, a depreciation in the general wage scale would have been inevitable. Sound common sense as usual lies back of the President's words.

### REPORT CONDITIONS GOOD IN INDUSTRY

#### Department of Labor Statistics Show General Upward Trend in Recent Months

That the United States is enjoying a period of prosperity was emphasized by the report made by Secretary of Commerce Hoover to President Coolidge.

The United States is the only nation in the world showing a substantial gain in business affairs.

Figures submitted by Secretary Hoover show that the exports in March were valued at \$452,000,000—imports at \$385,000,000—leaving a trade balance in Uncle Sam's favor of \$67,000,000.

Comparison of figures showed that the export trade of the United States has increased nearly fifty per cent over that of 1914.

The report also shows that the outflow of gold which started last December is continuing. Exports of the yellow metal for March amounted to \$25,104,416. Against this were imports of \$7,337,322. Silver exports were greater than the imports by about \$1,300,000.

Another interesting item was found in the report of the Bureau of Railway Economics which disclosed the fact that the volume of freight carried in January and February exceeded that of any corresponding period.

### PALESTINE CENTER OF PILGRIMAGES

Palestine as a center for pilgrimage has received a new impetus this year. Representatives of every Christian sect in the world have met here during the past two months, with Easter marking the high-water mark for a record-breaking tourist season.

Representatives of American, British, French and Spanish churches, together with Armenians, Copts, Arabs, Russians, Greeks, Syrians and Abyssinians, participated in a series of religious conferences held under the auspices of the Near East Relief in its orphanage. The delegates, before adjourning, passed a resolution formulated by Dr. John Timothy Stone of Chicago, former Moderator of the Presbyterian church, as follows:

"The American people, through their great orphanage work in Bible lands, are helping to heal the scars of war, bringing these nationless orphans to independent self-support. Christian people throughout the world are grateful for this American leadership, which we trust will be continued until these thousands of rescued children are brought to useful citizenship."
