"UPTOWN TRIANON" TO BE CONSTRUCTED SOON

New Ballroom to Open on North Side, Chicago, Jan. 1; To Accommodate 10000

Chicago's fast-growing uptown theatrical center, Lawrence avenue between Broadway and Sheridan road, is to be the location of the largest and most beautiful ballroom in the world, comfortably accommodating ten thousand and superseding the south side Trianon, it was announced by Andrew Karzas, south side impresario, and Milton Plotke who have formed a syndicate and will start construction immediately as they intend the new ball room to be a New Year's gift to Chicago's North Side. Huzagh, Hill and Ebersson are the associated architects.

The Uptown Trianon, as it may be known, will be erected on the northwest corner of Lawrence and Winthrop avenues, just east of the Lawrence avenue "L" station. The property upon which this super-ballroom will be built measures 150x210 feet and is located in the heart of the north side that is fast becoming a theatrical center similar to 42nd and Broadway in New York. This location is just the new Uptown Theatre, one of the largest and finest in the country, located at Lawrence and Broadway, to be opened soon.
