For this service we charge \$1.80 for 18 lbs. (minimum bundle) and 10c per lb. for each additional pound.

SEMI-FINISHED SERVICE OR ROUGH DRY, brings your family wash to you with all flat pieces nicely ironed, the balance dried and starched where necessary to iron. This service costs but 13 cents per lb. and is almost complete inasmuch as there is but very little left to iron.

This service washes, dries, starches and irons your entire family wash complete ready to use. The charge is 12 cents per lb. for all flat work and 35 cents per lb. for all wearing apparel. Bishop Francis Clement Kelley administers First Holy Communion in Highland.

St. James Catholic church in Highland had distinguished company last Sunday when Rt. Rev. Francis C. Kelley, Bishop of Oklahoma, officiated at the 8 o'clock mass, as part of the celebration of the Children's First Communion Sunday in that Parish.

The visit of the famous bishop made it a gala festival for the children, although it came as a surprise to everyone except the Rev. Francis J. Magner, the pastor of the church, who was the assistant to Bishop Kelley when the latter, as Monsignor Kelley, was pastor of St. Francis Xavier's church in Wilmette.

Besides Father Magner, Bishop Kelley was assisted in the ceremonies by his secretary, the Rev. Richard St. John of Oklahoma City and the Rev. F. Siedenburg, S. J., dean of the School of Sociology of Loyola university.

"This is your Sunday," said Bishop Kelley to the assembled children in his sermon, "this is the day on which the ears of God are open to you and on which He will grant you the good things for which you pray to Him. Today you are beginning your intellectual life—begin it well!"

"St. James, the patron of your church has given you the secret in the epistle of today: Be ye doers of God's word, not hearers only. And remember that the good works will come easily to you if you will only get into the habit of doing them."

"For one of these good habits, let it be your practice to say your daily prayers, for you can't get away from God if you will only fasten yourself to him by prayer."

THE MEMORIAL PROJECT

The plan conceived by several local organizations of erecting a suitable memorial to the local heroes of the World war is a commendable one and should have general support here.

The men and women who gave their lives for their country in its time of need require no monument to immortalize their names among their friends and fellow citizens of this age. Their memory is enshrined in the hearts of those who remain to profit by their glorious sacrifice. But for the generations to come it is fitting that there should be a memorial to recall the patriotism of the heroes of the past, a shining mark to attract the attention of those who come after to the deeds of those stirring years when the world went to war for an ideal; to the glorious share which America had in the final victory, and to the splendid part so nobly played by the young men and women of our city in that great drama.

A memorial adequate in artistic design has been chosen, and a location beautiful and fitting has been selected. There is now in progress a movement to raise sufficient funds to erect this memorial on the site set apart for it. This is where the citizens of Highland Park have an opportunity to demonstrate their sympathy with the project and their patriotic interest in the plan to provide a permanent and suitable monument to the men and women, living and dead who went from this city to serve their country in the great war. There can be no doubt of the immediate liberal response to be appeal for funds for such a cause.

WASTING ROAD FUNDS

Former Governor Ferguson of Texas, urges a halt on road bonds and favors building roads only as they can be paid for. The Texas situation is being paralleled in many other states, not because the people want fewer good roads, but because of the mania which has developed among road officials for building types of road that absorb more money than the taxpayers can produce.

An example of his tendency is seen in two recent road paving contracts awarded by a western state for paving an aggregate of 131.1 miles of highway, instead of accepting the low bids for a type of pavement which has not proved itself as good by the test of long usage, but which cost an aggregate of over \$20,000 more for the jobs in question. This additional \$20,000 would have paved approximately another mile of highway of this type that has proved satisfactory in the state in question.

Forcing exorbitant costs in highway construction will bring the downfall of our national good roads program which is now under way.
