Commissioner Gourley moved that Commissioner Cheney act as superintendent of the department of public health and safety in the absence of Commissioner Preston.

Commissioner Card moved to pass ordinance fixing salaries of firemen Nos. 1, 2 and 3 for the fiscal year.

Commissioner Cheney moved to pass ordinance making appropriations for the fiscal year, said ordinance to remain on file for public inspection until final passage.

For New Sidewalks
