BUSINESS MEN FIX DATE

Planning for Annual Celebration; Urge Increase in the Power of Lamps in Business Dist.

At the regular meeting of the Highland Park Business Men's association Tuesday evening, Wednesday Aug. 12 was selected for the annual Highland Park Day celebration this year. C. H. Witt was appointed general chairman, and preliminary work for the big day will begin at once.

Necessity of better street lighting facilities was emphasized, and Secretary W. H. Becker was authorized to address a letter to the city officials asking that the present 250-watt lamps on the ornamental street lighting poles be replaced by 100-watt lamps. It was pointed out that the business district of Highland Park is not as well lighted as similar sections of other North Shore cities, and it is felt that the facilities here are inadequate, because the ornamental light poles here are 150 feet apart, instead of 100 feet, as in some other cities. The secretary will forward the letter, as directed, and the association members are hoping that the city council will co-operate by permitting the increase in light power.

Dinner at Moraine
Eighty-three members of the Business Men's association attended this meeting, which was held following a splendid dinner at the Moraine hotel. Four applications for membership were received.

A committee, composed of W. E. Becker, chairman; S. A. St. Peter, C. F. Grant, Paul L. Udell and Henry Winter, was appointed to call on all business houses to decorate for the celebration of Independence Day, July 4, under the auspices of the Elks lodge and the American Legion post here.

The National Association of Secretaries requested the membership of the secretary of the local association, and as the affiliation was deemed a benefit to the association, the membership was ordered taken out.

HIGH SCHOOL CLASS GRADUATES JUNE 18

One hundred students of the Class of 1925 will be graduated from Deerfield-Shields high school at the annual commencement exercises to be held at the Elm Place auditorium Highland Park, on Thursday evening, June 18. The list of graduates is printed elsewhere in this paper.

This is not so large a class as those of 1923 and 1924, but it has made good showings in several lines and is composed of a fine lot of young people who give great promise of worthwhile careers.

The principal address will be made by State Supt. of Public Instruction Francis G. Blair. Mr. Blair has been head of the Illinois state education department for many years and is thoroughly conversant with every phase of education throughout the world. His address should be well worth hearing.

Because of the limited seating capacity of the auditorium, admission will be by tickets which have been distributed among the class members for their parents and friends, the school administration reserving some for a similar purpose. In all about 1200 tickets have been given out, but it is not expected that more than 1,000 persons will attend the exercises, and this will not unduly tax the accommodations of the auditorium.

WELL KNOWN LOCAL RESIDENT IS DEAD

Mr. Edwards was born here Nov. 13, 1867, and had always lived here. He was married Aug. 31, 1918, and his widow, Mrs. Martha Edwards and daughter, Eileen, survive. There are also two sisters, Mrs. Mary Dugdale, Evanston, and Mrs. Mary Boden, Ravinia. A half-brother, James Boylan, lives here.
The funeral was held at 9 o'clock Monday morning, at the Church of the Immaculate Conception, Dr. O'Neill officiating, and burial was beside the grave of his mother in Calvary cemetery.
