## FIELD EXPEDITION BAGS RARE ANIMAL

IS FOR CHICAGO MUSEUM

Unique Trophy Captured Deep In Jungle of Belgian Congo; Cablegram Brings News

An okapi, "trophy of trophies" and mystery animal of the African equatorial forest, has just been bagged by the Field Museum expedition to the Belgian Congo.

The information was received in a laconic cablegram from Edmund Heller, naturalist and big game hunter, leader of the expedition, who is accompanied by his wife, Dr. Hilda Heller. The rare prize is described as a strange and beautiful creature about the size of an ox, with a body like a zebra's and the horned head of a giraffe. It was captured with the assistance of "pygmies," a midgrade race of people that dwell deep in the jungles inhabited by the Okapi.

In Dense Tropic Forest  
The beast inhabit the steaming smoky forests of the Congo, described by Sir Harry Johnston, an Englishman who verified its existence about 25 years ago, as almost "unbeatable with its Turkish-bath heat, its reeking moisture and its powerful smell of decaying vegetation where "we seemed, in fact, to be transplanted back to the miasma times, to an age and a climate scarcely suitable for the modern type of real humanity."

While the body of the okapi suggests that of the zebra, the long forelegs pitch the foreparts upward, somewhat like the tilt of a giraffe. The neck is short, not much longer than a stag's and the giraffe-like head is created with large ears.

Unique Coloring  
"The color of the animal is extraordinary," said W. H. Osgood, curator of the museum. "The cheeks and jaws are yellowish white, contrasting with the dark neck, the forehead is a deep red chestnut and ears of the same color are tipped with jet black. A black line follows the ridge of the nose down to the nostrils. The muzzle is a supple with a tinge of reddish yellow around the upper lip.

"The neck, shoulders and body range from sepia and black to a rich red. The tail is bright red with a black tuft. The hind quarters, snowy white, or cream colored, touched here and there with tawny, are marked with purple-black stripes that give them a zebra-like appearance. On the skull are three horns, which may, at one time, have been as prominent as those of the giraffe."

Heller's cablegram did not explain whether the animal had been shot or captured alive. There are only a few mounted specimens of the okapi in existence.

Some of the legislatures are passing laws requiring full length bed sheets in hotels, but they have done nothing to prevent travellers from growing over six feet in height.
