LIBERTYVILLE WILL CELEBRATE JULY 4TH

Elaborate Plans Being Made for Festivities; Robinson Attractions Engaged

Libertyville is going to celebrate the Fourth of July in no unmistakable manner this year and has made arrangements to stage one of the biggest programs of entertainment in Northern Illinois.

To that end they have arranged for two days of horse racing, with horses and jockeys from Latonia, Churchill Downs and Hawthorne competing. Two baseball games, on Saturday between McHenry and Libertyville and on Sunday between the Chicago Union Giants (Colored) and Libertyville.

Riding devices will be on the grounds for the youngsters, games for all and the Robinson attractions of Chicago will produce a big hippodrome and circus program of headline acts from the big state fair programs, which they exclusively cater to.

Among the hippodrome features which will be ten or more in number will be Madame Bedini, the world's greatest equestrienne with her stable of highly educated horses. The Australian Waites, expert whip crackers from the Antipodes, Rose Ellis and Rose who are now headlining the big Orpheum circuit. The latter are acrobats and gymnasts of the first water.

Music, concessions and shows will make up a greater mid-way pleasure, but the feature of the evening, after the hippodrome show will be a mammoth display of pyrotechnics by the Gordon Fireworks Company of Chicago, under the personal supervision of J. Saunders Gordon. This will be the great patriotic spectacle of the day and will conclude the entertainment features each night.

1,000 additional grand stand seats have been ordered in order that all may have good location to witness the races and hippodrome. Parking space for thousands of autos has been arranged for and picnickers are welcome, they will find every convenience. Libertyville will have a real old fashioned Independence Day, and invites everyone in Illinois to participate.

It is about time that someone laid down the axiom that while making two blades of grass grow where one grew before is correct and proper from an agricultural standpoint, that the Washington habit of developing two highly paid jobs, or commissions, where even the existence of one is not justified, should be stopped.

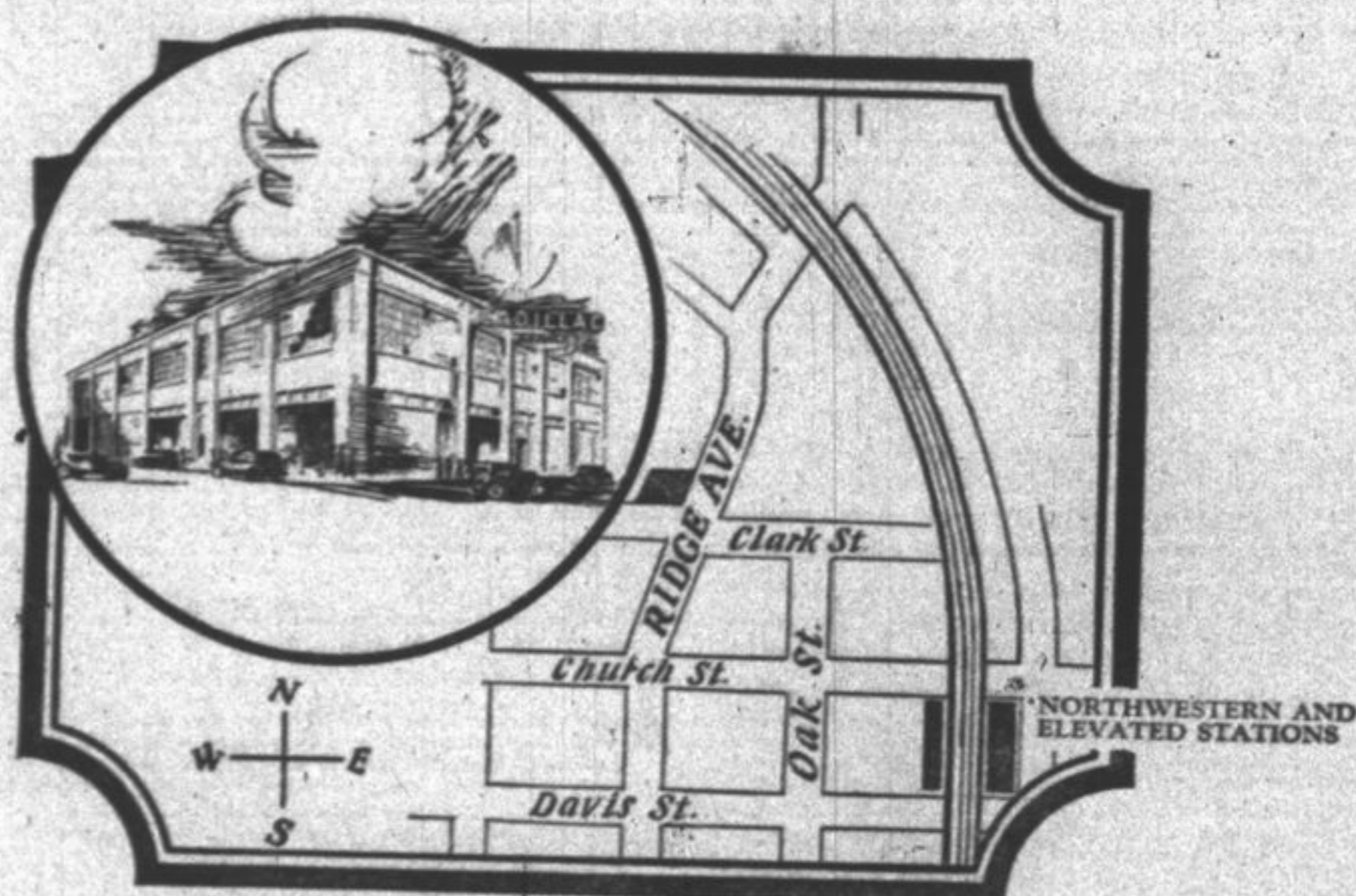
