### ALL STAR COURSE FOR HIGHLAND PARK Civic Music Association Promises Famous Artists Next Season; Concerts Tuesdays

If all present plans are carried out and there is no reason why they should not be carried out, Highland Park, under the auspices of the Civic Music association will hear some of the world's most famous artists in recital next winter. With the completion of the new high school auditorium, one of the finest concert halls will be available, and if the general public responds readily in subscribing this all star course, the seating capacity of the new auditorium will allow to allot several hundred seats to students at the very nominal fee of three dollars for the five concerts planned.

The regular subscription for the course of five concerts in which seven famous artists are to appear is six and ten dollars.

It is planned to have all concert take place on Tuesday nights, the first scheduled is for October 8, when Sigrid Onegin, the world's greatest contralto, will open the course. One of New York's most famous critics, Pitts Sanborn, wrote in the New York Globe: "Sigrid Onegin has a voice one is likelier to dream of than to hear." When Onegin sang in Chicago at Orchestra hall last year Edward Moore wrote in the Chicago Tribune: "Of all the contralto voices in memory there is none like hers."

Other attractions offered in the course are equally important. On November 10, the distinguished English baritone, John Barclay, is scheduled to appear. December 15, brings a combination of the famous New York String Quartet of whom the critic in the New York Evening World wrote: "Its ensemble is as nearly perfect as one can find," and H. T. Parker of the Boston Transcript made the significant comment about the New York String Quartet: "In sum, a quartet to remind a public over-set in old habits, over-content with old admirations, that 'The Flonzaleys' are not the be-all and the end-all of chamber music; nor the 'Kneisel Tradition' imperative and inviolable." With the New York String Quartet will appear the sensational young Russian American pianist, Gitta Grudova, who, although only twenty years of age, is considered as one of the foremost of women pianists on the platform today. January 17 brings the delightful combination of Renee Thornton and her distinguished husband and accompanist, Richard Hageman. "Voice and beauty. Love-ly singing. Pronounced success," thus wrote Edward Moore in the Chicago Tribune about the distinguished
