BARBERRY PLANTS IN ROGUE GALLERY
 ARE SUSPECTED OF HARM

Forty or Fifty Varieties in the Country and All Regarded With Suspicion Says Dept. Report

The common barberry, which has merited and received so much public condemnation because of its reputation as an accomplice in spreading the black stem rust of small grain, has several relatives of the same family name scattered here and there in the United States. There are some 40 or 50 of these barberry relatives cultivated as ornamentals in this country, and they are all to be regarded with suspicion, says the United States Department of Agriculture, until definitely proved harmless.

Harmful Species
 Heretofore but little attention has been paid to any barberry except the common European variety, now widely naturalized in this country. During the last few years, however, a harmful native barberry species has been found abundant in the Appalachian Mountains of southwestern Virginia, southern West Virginia, and western North Carolina. This species is naturally susceptible and spreads stem rust to grains and certain wild grasses. In some localities, at least, it is as much a menace to grain production as is the common barberry. Numerous clumps of bushes of this species have been found also in Indiana along the Tippecanoe River, but not in the woodlands or fence rows of near-by farms.

Recent Comets
 Most of the species of barberry now present in the United States have come in during the past 10 years, as a result of the impetus given the barberry as an ornamental by the explorers in China. It is not known definitely whether all of these species are harmful, although it is reasonable to assume that most of them are. In order to give the public the benefit of any of them which may be harmless, so that they may be safely used as ornamentals, the United States Department of Agriculture is gathering into one "rogue gallery," for future conviction or acquittal, representatives of all of these suspicious members of the barberry family, as well as the Mahonias, a closely related genus. All species will be grown in a special "barberry garden," recently established at Bell, Md., propagated, interbred and hybridized, and the resultant plants sent to the testing station at St. Paul, Minn., where they will be inoculated with stem rust in order to determine their susceptibility and resistance of immunity.

Information Sought
 This information about the disease-carrying powers of all species of the barberry family is sought in order that the propagation and dissemination of undesirable foreign importations may be prevented in this country. Some of these barberries are very desirable ornamentals. They will be given a hasty "pardon" as soon as possible if their innocence is fairly established.

"DEAD LETTERS" NOT SACRED; ARE PERUSED
 If You Don't Want Your Correspondence Opened Mail It Right

There is something of sacredness about the contents of a letter. The writer often reveals more of himself on the written page than he would in direct conversation. This revelation, of course, is designed only for the eyes of the correspondent.

In this country a wholesome respect has been built up for the sanctity of a letter but it is not so respected in many other countries where the opening and reading of sealed mail becomes, at times, so prevalent that the practice has earned the appellation of "cracking seals."

The average American would be filled with wrath and the timid soul would shrink with horror at the thought of a third person, and a stranger at that, reading his "personal correspondence."

Yet, that is exactly what happens to 21,000,000 letters a year and will continue so long as letter writers fail to put return addresses on their envelopes.

When a letter, without a return address, cannot be delivered for any reason, it is sent, after a certain time, to the Dead Letter Office.

There it is opened and read—not for the possible scandal it may contain—but with a view to finding some clue which will enable forwarding on to the addressee or returning to the sender.

Out of every five letters received at the Dead Letter Office such a clue is found in one and it is sent merrily on its delayed way to one or the other of the two persons most interested in its disposition. The other four are destroyed.

Every person knows his own address and if he would put it on the envelope, the contents would remain inviolate and the letter would be returned with notice of non-delivery.

ADVICE FOR MOTOR TOURING IN CANADA
 NECESSARY STEPS GIVEN

By Following Instructions of Chicago Motor Club All Inconveniences May Be Avoided

Motorists wishing to travel into Canada for visiting or sight-seeing purposes only may do so without a loss of time by following the instructions of the touring bureaus of the Chicago Motor Club.

1. You are not required to have a permit to stay in Canada 24 hours providing entrance and exit are made at the same port.

2. When your stay is over 24 hours or by leaving at a different port, a touring permit is required. You must have both the engine number and the serial number clean and legible so the inspectors can see them.

3. Stop at the United States inspector's office and secure a customs clearance.

Be sure to have your state registration card. Then proceed to the Canadian inspector's office and they will direct you to a broker's office, where tour-permits are made out. This requires about five minutes and costs 50 cents. Return to the Canadian inspector's office; here you sign the permit and are then allowed to proceed.

4. Keep your United States clearance, touring permit and state registration card in a convenient place, as you may be called upon at any time to show them to the police.

5. In leaving Canada, stop at the Canadian inspector's office, surrender the touring permit which you will be asked to sign; then go to the United States inspector's office, where you will be asked a few questions,

and return the United States customs slip.

Information required by the customs inspectors, other than that on your card, is:

Value of car, number of passengers, number of spare tires, the port from which you leave Canada.

Should you wish to keep your car in Canada for a period longer than 50 days, it will be necessary to provide a bond. Under this bond you may stay for a period up to six months in one calendar year. Custom brokers will arrange bonds. The cost of the bond is from \$5 to \$10.

PRESIDENT'S PLAN WIDELY APPROVED
 In the Matter of Study of the Constitution of U. S. In the Schools

Word has been received in Washington from numerous sections of the country endorsing the President's stand in the matter of the studying of the Constitution in the schools of the country.

The President's thought is that the study of the Constitution by the children would no doubt have a most important influence upon the parents.

Of course, for years one of the items in the curriculum of high schools has been the "Constitution of the United States," but in the vast majority of instances this teaching has been of rather a perfunctory character. It had not had instilled in it the sympathetic understanding to which it is entitled.

Indications are that this fall will see the Constitution being regarded by the pupils of schools of the country as a thing that is vital, a thing that is of real import, something that enters directly and intimately into their lives. When such an appreciation has been gained by the million and a half school children of the nation there will be a greater and higher regard for the law of the land.
