WINNETKA WOMEN TO ENTERTAIN TOTS

Will Take Care of Groups from Chicago During Summer; Several Clubs

Twelve Winnetka women's clubs will assist in giving weekly entertainments to Chicago tenement children who will be brought to the north shore town by the Graham Taylor settlement.

The first group, consisting of about forty children, was received July 1 by the following circles, Pine avenue, West Elm and Walden road.

The women pay the fares for the children and their mothers from the settlement to Winnetka. Upon arrival they will be taken on a long automobile ride through the north shore suburbs. Following a luncheon, the children will be taken to the beach, where they will play games and bathe.

Sixty suits have been purchased by the women, who are operating under the auspices of the Winnetka Community house. The suits will be kept at the community house and each week they will be given to the visiting children.

The following circles will entertain during the summer: July 8, Scott and Rosewood avenues; July 15, Elm and Lincolnwood avenues; July 20, Euclid avenue; July 22, Ash and Cherry streets; July 28, Lincoln and Ridge avenues.

Word was received at the community house of the safe arrival of the thirty-one Winnetka boys who left last week for a two-week vacation at Lake Hamlin, Mich. The boys are under the supervision of Dr. J. W. F. Davies, director of the Winnetka Community house. Assisting him are Dr. George Eisenbrand, Arthur Barrett, Jack Hamilton, Cabry Ortlay and Dou Crawford.

COOK COUNTY CANT SECEDE FROM STATE

"Cook county couldn't secede from Illinois if it wanted to, and a writ of mandamus, asking the courts to force

the legislature to redistrict the state would be futile," said Prof. Kenneth Colegrove of the political science department of Northwestern university in commenting on the latest move of the Chicago city council to secure proper representation in the legislature.

"There is no remedy at law," said Prof. Colegrove. "An attempt to form a new state would be unconstitutional. The constitution requires the consent of the state legislature before permitting a section of a state to secede and the Illinois legislature never would consent to such a move.

"A writ of mandamus such as proposed by the city council would be futile. The court is a different branch of government and out of courtesy would probably not force the hand of the legislature. Even if the writ were granted there is now way it could be enforced against the legislature."

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
