State Exhibit Rules

The rules for the exhibition provide that entries must be in at least 48 hours in advance of the opening of the exhibit, and the exhibits must be in position on or before noon of the day of the exhibit. All exhibits shown must have been grown by exhibitors for at least 90 days preceding the exhibit, and are to be arranged in classes as far as possible. Commercial florists or nursery-men will not be eligible to compete for the prizes.

SUPER-HIGHWAY FOR NORTH SHORE, IDEA

ELEVATED IS SUGGESTION

SI Mayer is Trying to Interest Officials of Communities Between Chicago and Milwaukee

An elevated highway to enable motorists to reach Milwaukee in an hour and a quarter and Evanston in eight minutes has been worked out with much preliminary detail by SI Mayer for presentation of plans to the mayors and presidents of all north shore suburbs.

North and south lanes for unlimited speed are to occupy the center of the proposed roadway with a low barrier between. Good cars might make up to 90 miles an hour on this drive, said Mr. Mayer. Next to the unlimited speed lanes are lanes for cars running 30 to 60 miles an hour then lanes for cars going 15 to 30, and finally on the outer and inner edges of the roadway are narrow strips reserved for single file parking or for emergency repair jobs.

It is estimated that motors could make the following schedule:

- Chicago to Milwaukee, 75 minutes.
- Chicago to Racine, 54 minutes.
- Chicago to Kenosha, 44 minutes.
- Chicago to Zion, 35 minutes.
- Chicago to Waukegan, 29 minutes.
- Chicago to Lake Forest, 22 minutes.
- Chicago to Highland Park, 17 minutes.
- Chicago to Winnetka, 10 minutes.
- Chicago to Evanston, 8 minutes.

Explains Plan

Mr. Mayer, who is president of the Illinois Safety Council, a member of the mayor safety commission and secretary of the Chicago Police department, as well as president of the North Shore Motor club, announced his plan this morning, laying stress on the fact that "a 90-mile-an-hour speedway leading from all north shore towns into Chicago will prevent accidents."

"There will be no grade crossings, practically no curves, no mixing of speeds and no pedestrians," said Mr. Mayer. "Therefore the north shore motor highway will eliminate accidents."

Is Optimistic

"I have no doubt it will be built, even if it costs as much as did the Panama canal, because the assessments will spread over the five counties, and the roadway out into the lake will create new made land 1200 feet wide and 70 miles long. This will give to every town north to Milwaukee a city park equal in value to the cost of the roadway. Figure out the value of this 70 miles of new lake shore property a quarter mile deep. I also know the towns will be for it because individual members of the various village councils from Winnetka to Milwaukee and the Milwaukee Motor club, to whom I have briefed the plan, are unanimously for it."

CHICAGO MAN DROWNS NEAR LAKE FOREST

One drowning occurred in the county over the week-end, while the heat drove hundreds to the lakes and beaches. The victim was Karel Volkoun, 2341 Central Park ave., Chicago.

Volkoun's body was found at noon Sunday in the lake near the Cyrus H. McCormick estate in Lake Forest. His clothing lay on the beach in a pup tent, where he had evidently spent the night.

Whether he died from drowning or heart failure was not determined. An inquest was to be held by Coroner Taylor this afternoon at the Wenban undertaking establishment in Lake Forest.

The body was partly out of water. It was found in about three feet of water by Bob Kocourek, 1400 South Fifty-seventh avenue, Cicero, and John Louzenty, 2505 Trumbull avenue, Chicago. The lungs contained little water, and it is believed he may have died from heart failure caused by the shock of the cold water.

A union card showed he was a painter. Relatives in Chicago got in touch with the undertaking establishment and said they would attend the inquest.
