**HUDSON HITS TRUCK ON WAUKEGAN ROAD**  
 Early Monday Morning while Car Is Being Towed; Occupants Are Injured

A bad smashup occurred on Waukegan road in front of the Henry J. Jurend and Josephine Woodman homes early Monday morning at 3:30. The six injured young people were taken into the home of Miss Woodman, who is a nurse.

A Ford coupe was towing a large Hudson touring car with a rope. They had been riding since two o'clock the day before and all night from Waukegan, Wis., and had been towing the big car since they left, Fon du Lac. Mr. E. Lowes and sister Mrs. Wright were in the Ford, and in the Hudson were two of the Lowe children and four of neighbor's children (ranging in age from 15 to 20) was being guided by one of the boys. The car being towed was well into the middle of the road and crashed into a truck bound for Milwaukee. The Hudson was completely smashed and the steering apparatus of the truck was broken.

The four girls and two boys were all badly cut and bruised, the driver escaping with the least injury.

One girl had several broken teeth and a tooth pushed through her lip, one had a sprained ankle and an injured wrist, and a third had an injured wrist, also. Some suffered severe bruises on their backs and heads, and all were terribly cut. The owner of the car was Mr. E. Lowes of Madison street, Chicago. Mr. Lowes and Mrs. Wright conduct a hardware store in that city.

An uncle from Austin took the injured young people home Monday morning about seven o'clock. The truck had to call for assistance and another truck took its load and it was not towed away until about four o'clock Monday afternoon. Traffic at this point was congested all day.

The cars were not going very fast and the driver of the truck, seeing the approaching car, did not dare to drive off the concrete road as there were high piles of soft clay on either side of the road left from the digging of the sewer.
