AIMING TO CONNECT N. S. WATER SYSTEMS

Would Link Them With Oak Park, and Other Towns to West; First Steps

First steps in linking up north shore villages with communities to the west for the purpose of obtaining a single source of water supply have been taken in Wilmette, where the village council is seriously considering the feasibility of agreeing to the plan.

The Suburban Water company, which is engineering the plan, hopes to link together the north shore villages with Oak Park, Riverside, Cicero and Brookfield, together with intervening communities. Water would then be supplied to all of these communities from one source, according to the plan.

Definite action has not been taken by the Wilmette administration, but the matter is now in the hands of the committee on sewers and water, and a report is to be made at the next session. C. N. Rogers, village engineer, has been authorized to review the past records of the water situation in Wilmette and submit a report.

The project as planned by the Suburban company would necessitate the construction of an intake 3,000 feet off shore from Kenilworth. From here would be run a seven-foot tunnel along a line between Kenilworth and Wilmette, where a filtration plant of 75,000,000-gallon capacity would be installed. Mains from this point would then be run to various communities which join in the plan.

The territory now under consideration has a population of approximately 220,000, but the contemplated system, it is said, would anticipate the needs of double that population.
