Miss Josephine Prichard of Indianapolis, Ind., has been the guest of Miss Marjorie Leaming for the past week.

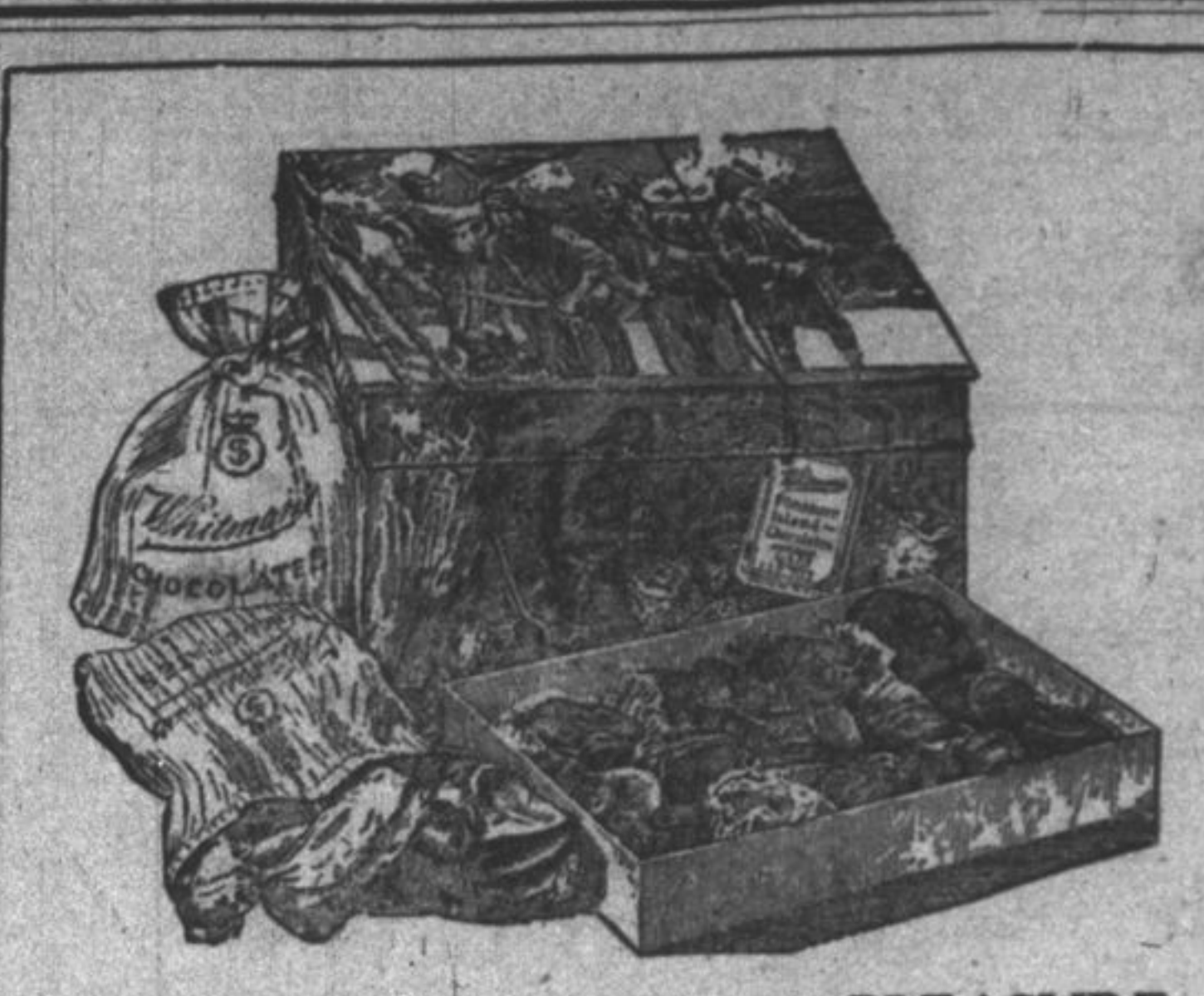
