DEERFIELD GARDEN CLUB MET WEDNESDAY

Mrs. Walter B. Metcalf Is Hostess; Mrs. R. L. Johnson Gives Talk Interesting

Mrs. Walter B. Metcalf opened her delightful home on the County Line road last week Wednesday to members of the Garden club. The house has recently been extensively remodeled and the spacious living room filled with flowers made a charming setting for the club's program.

After a short business meeting the afternoon was turned over to the leader, Mrs. R. L. Johnson, who very ably and interestingly presented her subject "Flower Arrangement." Her informal talk was very instructive. She illustrated the various points in the principles of flower arrangement by calling attention to the different bowls and vases of flowers, which she had previously gathered from some of the members' gardens. One tall, slender vase crowded with anemones and gaillardia showed the improper "sandwiching" of flowers, which she compared to a charming brown glass vase containing the same kinds of flowers properly arranged. Mrs. Johnson told of various ways to keep cut flowers fresh.

In closing she demonstrated how effectively rosy morn petunias can be combined with white baby's breath by first showing an obviously incorrect use of purple and pink petunias in an orange colored dish, and then rearranging the pink petunias and baby's breath in a low pale green bowl, calling attention to the different principles as she arranged the combination. After a short discussion of the subject her audience expressed a sincere appreciation of her splendid talk.

A further general discussion of the subject of "Mid-season Planting" was then taken up and then one of the most enjoyable afternoons of the club's many pleasant ones came to a close with the serving of delicious refreshments on the delightfully cool porch.

The club plans to make a tour of about six gardens of the members on August 5.
