**Happenings Here and There in This Section of the North Shore and Vicinity; County Seat**

The architect for the North Shore railroad is working on the plans for the new passenger station and office building for Waukegan it is reported.

In a 25-foot fall from a hay loft, Joseph Williams, aged 58, of Fox Lake, suffered injuries from which for a time he was in a critical condition.

States Attorney A. V. Smith is trying to locate a traveler who accommodated two Waukegan merchants with travelers checks that had the earmarks of being none too good.

Thomas Hogan, 78, aged resident of the town of Newport, died recently at the Lake County General hospital. Death was hastened by a fall suffered by the aged man three months ago in which he injured his hip.

Deep Lake last week gave up the body of ten-year old Glen Smith, of 5340 Cuyler avenue, Chicago, who had been the object of a search since the previous Sunday evening when he was last seen rowing out into the lake.

Sheriff Ahlstrom has added to his force by appointing William Kelley, former chief of police at Lake Bluff, as deputy sheriff. He will ride a motorcycle on the Waukegan road. In addition to this duty, he is a constable in Shields township.

Five hundred residents of Waukegan are violating the provisions of the state fire law and are to be prosecuted by the state fire marshal unless they take steps immediately to remedy conditions. This was learned when a copy of the Illinois Fire Prevention Bureau Report was received.

The full valuation for Waukegan covering real estate, and not personal property, is \$14,740,560, according to Charles O. Armes, assessor, who made his annual report last week. The assessed value is one-half of this amount and upon which taxes are paid. That is an increase of \$587,050 over the past year, when the valuation was set at \$14,153,510.

**WINNETKA WILL RUN NEW LIGHT SYSTEM**

**Community Plans to Control the Maintenance of New Ornamental Outfit**

Winnetka's new electric street light system which is to be turned on Aug. 12 will be maintained by the village instead of being turned over to a private corporation to operate, according to a decision reached this week by the village board of trustees.

Under municipal operation the lights can be maintained at a cost considerably less than if privately operated, the trustees were told. For some time the village heads had considered turning the operation of the new system over to the Public Service company of Illinois, which now operates the lighting systems in a number of north shore towns and villages.

"We can operate the lights at a cost which will run \$2,000 or \$3,000 a year less than the company charges," stated Clarence E. Drayter, chairman of the public service committee of the board. "The company would grant us a flat rate of \$22,975 annual charge. Although this would include upkeep and current as well as our estimates show we can run the new system at a cost much less."

"We already have a five-year contract from the company to supply us with current but further than that the village will handle the system." Plans are under way to stage a gala program on the date when the lights are turned on. A holiday will be declared in the village and all stores will close.

**WINNETKA P. T. A. IS HOUSING TEACHERS**

Faced with a housing crisis because of the large number of new teachers who will come to Winnetka this fall, the housing committee of the Winnetka Parent-Teacher association, of which Mrs. W. R. Riethermer is chairman, has leased the third floor of the Eckhart building on Elm street and is remodeling it into four apartments. Work has already been started on these and they will be completed and ready for occupancy before the fall term of school starts, it is said. Two of the apartments will be large ones and two will be of smaller dimensions. They will be completely furnished, and will be rented to the teachers who desire them at as low a rental as is possible. The housing committee expects these apartments to provide homes for at least six teachers.
