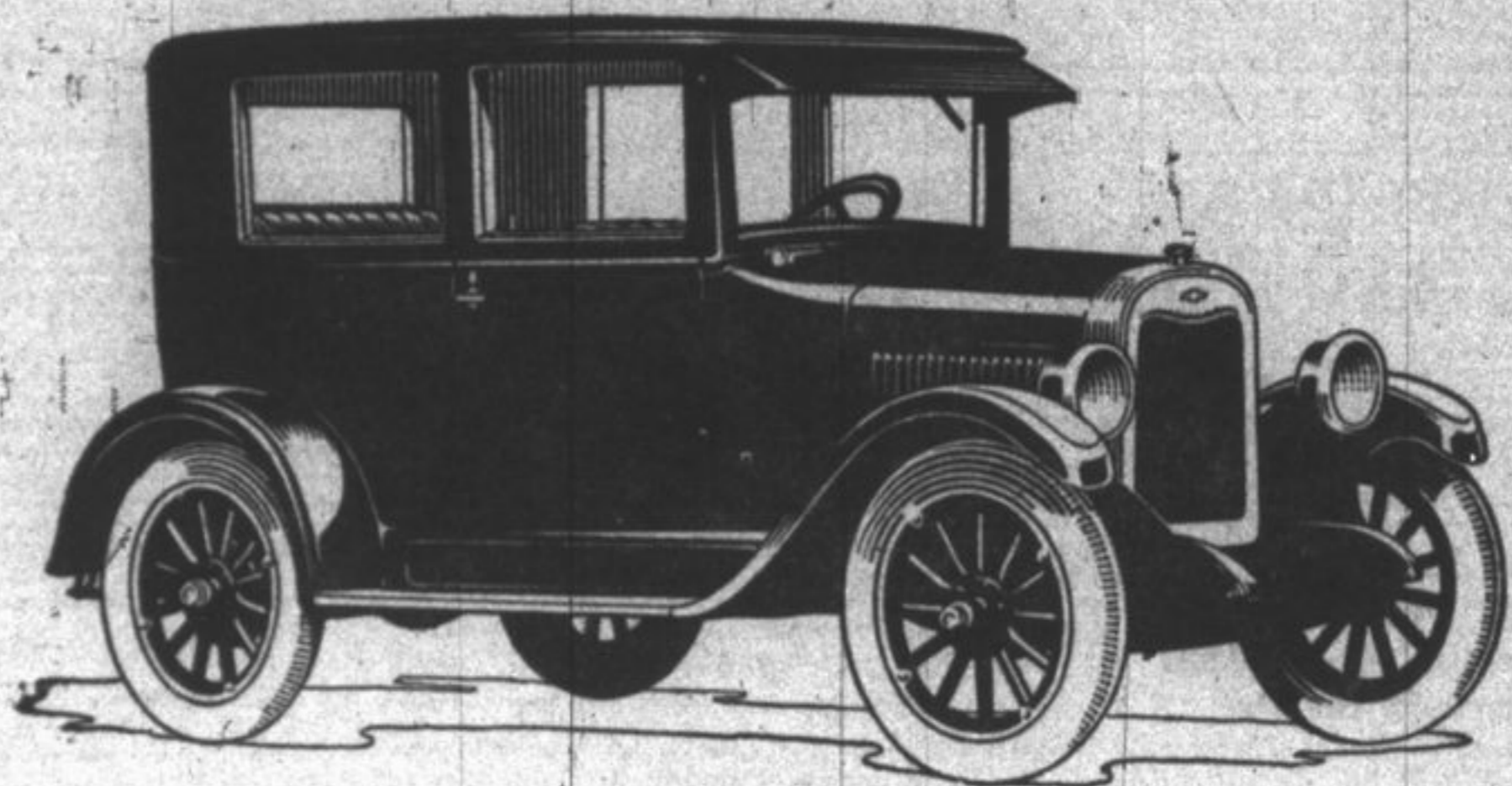

William Bubert, a local man, received the bid on special assessments, number 24 and 25 which are for water on Central avenue and Deerfield avenue. The Pastoret Construction Co. which is just completing the West Side sewer system was awarded the bids on numbers 23, 26, 27 and 28, which are Central avenue sewer, Small Northwest sewer, Large Northwest Storm sewer, and Northwest Sanitary sewer.

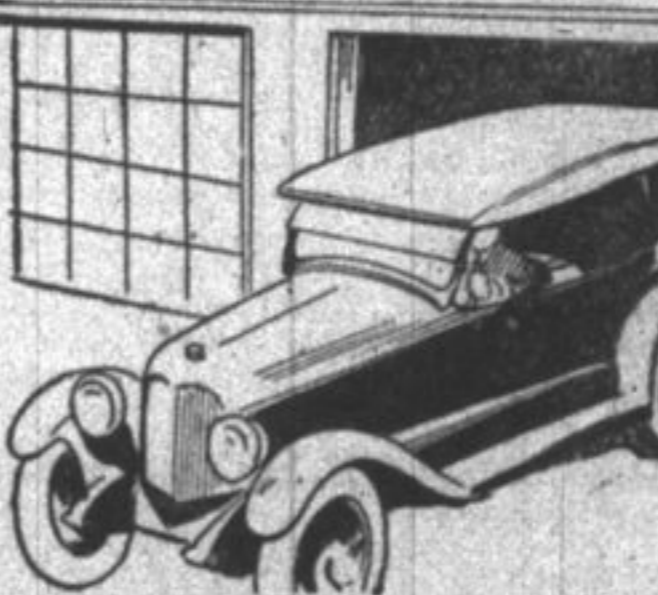
