

HIGHLAND PARK BOYS GET HONORS AT CAMP

MANY PRIZES AWARDED

"Veterans" Strike Tents and Leave Camp Roosevelt; Vice President Dawes Visits During Closing Week

After the most successful season in its history of seven years Camp Roosevelt packed its tents Saturday and five hundred "veterans" started home.

The closing exercises of the school again gave evidence of the unusual progress made by students in junior and senior high school classes in this environment. The R. O. T. C. company, having had more intensive military training looked like regular soldiers.

The Juniors, 12 to 14 years old, more than two hundred and fifty of them, developed into the finest, snappiest group of boys to be found anywhere.

All returned home in good health, good spirits and the determination as veterans to sustain the reputation of Camp Roosevelt through the coming winter and to return next year. Once more this unusual combination of military training, school, athletics, swimming, first aid and other instruction on a government post under the flag has proved itself a boy builder and developer of the best qualities of future citizenship.

A number of Highland Park boys received prizes for distinction in various lines of activity at Camp Roosevelt.

Corporal Webster Dowd received a military training medal. Private Stephen Chase got a marksman and basic medal. Privates Barrett Mason and Page Beers received basic medals and in addition Beers was awarded an achievement medal. Private Melbourne got a marksman and basic medal. Private Robert Childs received a basic medal and a long range bar. Privates Peter Prato, Samuel Holmes, Henry Parkin and John Putnam also attended the camp. All of these boys were in the Senior Camp or R. O. T. C. section.

Highland Park boys in the Junior camp also carried themselves through with great credit. Edward Loewenstein received a gold bear, a silver bear, a Junior Life Saving badge, an American Red Cross medal, a certificate for first aid, and a rifle marksmanship badge. LAY 20 MILES OF TEMPORARY TRACK

More than 20 miles of temporary track have been laid in construction work of the new North Shore Extension line of the Chicago, North Shore and Milwaukee railway, being built north from Dempster street, Niles Center, to Lake Forest.

The temporary track has been laid past Glenview road to the south, where a station will be built, and will continue south to Dempster street.

Work is progressing very rapidly. More than 1000 men are working. Workmen are quartered in two main camps, one at Blodgett on the Deerfield road, and the other at Libertyville.

Eight locomotives and more than 100 cars are used in the filling in of the roadbed, which will require about 40,000 cubic yards of dirt.

When the roadbed is filled, the temporary track will be replaced with permanent tracks of heavy steel for fast traffic.

DRIVER KILLED WHEN AUTO TURNS TURTLE

TWO OTHERS ARE INJURED

James Malget, Deerfield Brick-maker, Victim of Accident on Ridge Road Last Saturday Evening

James Malget, 27, whose home is on the County Line road near Waukegan road, was crushed to death Saturday evening when the car which he was driving skidded on a curve and turned over twice. The accident occurred on Ridge road near the August Johnson farm, between Deerfield road and Clavey road. With him in the car were his son and his brother-in-law from Evanston. Both escaped with minor injuries.

Malget was taking the car out for a tryout, intending to purchase the machine if it should prove to be satisfactory. He had been driving a Ford and was not accustomed to the operation of the larger car.

At the curve the machine swerved too far and then turned turtle. Assistance was summoned, but the injured man died soon after the accident.

An inquest was held by Coroner J. L. Taylor, and an autopsy disclosed the fact that death was caused by hemorrhages resulting from internal injuries.

James Malget was employed as a brickmaker by the National Brick Company. He is survived by a wife and two children, the eldest being two years old. The Malgets have lived in the Jordan house on the County Line road for about a year.

The brick yard was closed Tuesday out of respect for the deceased. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at the Holy Cross Church, and interment was in St. Mary's cemetery.

HOTEL EMPLOYE IS DROWNED IN LAKE

BODY RECOVERED SUNDAY

Mateo Locatelli Loses In Struggle Against Undertow; Inquest Held Sunday By Coroner Taylor

Mateo Locatelli, 23, an employee at the Moraine hotel, was drowned last Friday afternoon while swimming in the lake near the hotel. A companion caught hold of him, but was unable to pull him to safety.

Locatelli worked at the hotel until early in the afternoon, and then ate a heavy meal before going to the lake. It is believed that this caused him to suffer cramps after he had been in the cold water a short time. Drowning followed a struggle against a strong undertow, which finally swept the man out into water above his depth. His companion, another employe of the hotel, was a much smaller man. Other swimmers not far away were called to for help but Locatelli sank before any of them could reach him. The accident occurred about 3:15 o'clock.

Life Guard James Griffith responded to an alarm sent in a short time later, and attempted to locate the body. The search lasted throughout the rest of the afternoon and evening but was unavailing. The water is said to be about fifteen or twenty feet deep where the man went down. Sunday morning Griffith succeeded in locating the body. He was notified that the head of a man was showing above the surface of the water, and upon investigation found that the body of Locatelli had floated to the surface.

The body was removed to the Prior undertaking parlors, whence it was taken to the home of Santi Ori, Locatelli's uncle, in Highwood. Coroner J. L. Taylor held an inquest Sunday, and a verdict of accidental drowning was returned.

MAIL ROBBERS GET POUCH AT HIGHWOOD

Three Men In Ford Truck Get Away With Bag Dropped From Train

Three robbers in a Ford truck succeeded in getting away with a pouch of mail after it had been dropped at the Highwood station Wednesday afternoon.

The train which arrives in Highwood at 2:12 p. m. daily leaves a bag of mail on the station platform. Wednesday afternoon as soon as the train had left three men drove up to the platform, took the pouch and then drove rapidly southward in Green Bay road.

Several workmen who were unloading coal from a flat car near the station witnessed the robbery, but were too far from the scene to start pursuit.

Postmistress Mary Walsh has notified the federal inspector in charge for this district. It is believed that the pouch contained first class mail. Whether or not anything of great value was stolen is not known at present.
