2 DROWNED SUNDAY IN COUNTY LAKES

Fox Lake Fisherman Falls Out of Boat; Accident at Lake Zurich

Two men lost their lives in the lakes of Lake county Sunday morning. One victim, a fisherman, lost his life in Fox Lake. The second lost his life Sunday morning while swimming in Lake Zurich. His body was recovered late Monday.

A fishing expedition to Fox Lake resulted in a tragedy early Sunday morning when Philip Ronaski, 30, 629 North avenue, Chicago, employed as foreman for the Peoples Gas Light and Coke Company of that city, was drowned.

The three men had intended to spend practically the entire day in fishing. They had obtained a boat at the Mineola hotel and had rowed into the lake about sunrise.

In order that he might cast to better advantage, Ronaski stood up in the frail little boat. Suddenly he lost his balance and plunged into the water. He was some distance from the boat when he came up and efforts of his companions to reach him proved in vain. It appeared that Ronaski was not a swimmer and he was powerless to aid himself.

After abandoning their efforts to save their companion the other two men rowed to shore and reported the tragedy to the Fox Lake authorities. Boats were sent out and attempts were made to locate the victim by means of grappling hooks. These operations were continued all day Sunday but without success.

A Chicago youth, 18 years old, was drowned in Lake Zurich about three o'clock Sunday morning. His name was not learned by authorities.

The youth was holding to the rear of a boat and lost his hold while the occupants of the boat were not looking. They did not miss him until he had been in the water several minutes.

The body was recovered Monday afternoon by a diver. The youth drowned about 100 feet from shore.

W. M. WRIGHT'S HORSE IS RECORD BREAKER

Wonder Horse at Cleveland Belongs to Former Highland Park Man

The breaking of two world's records by Truax, his third similar performance in four days was a feature of the grand circuit card at North Randall Tuesday, according to a dispatch from Cleveland, Ohio. The horse is owned by William Monroe Wright, formerly of North Sheridan road, Highland Park.

Truax made history in the 2:12 class trot. After making a break in the first heat and finishing last in a field of nine, he took the lead in the second and was never headed. He won in 1:46 2-5, a new trotting record for seven-eighths of a mile. The previous mark was 1:47 2-5, set by Crawford at Lexington last October.

In the next heat Dick McMahon let Walter Cox take his Hollywood Jessie, the favorite into the lead until into the stretch, where Truax passed him and trotted the mile and an eighth in 2:19 2-5, clipping three-fifths of a second off the mark set by Truax Friday.
