> PANAMA AIR SERVICE Duties; Will Be There

Two Years Herbert Roll, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Roll, of Deerfield, Ill., with thirty other technicians of the Army Air Service at the France Field flying center, after passing the War Department tests for flyer, has been placed on duty requiring participation in regular and frequent aerial flights, according to Army orders made public recently. This duty, owing to its hazardous nature, carries a bonus of fifty per cent of the monthly pay re- 4

ceived by Army aviators. Roll, who is serving as a sergeant in the 63rd Service Squadron is reguarly engaged as an aviation mechanic in the Panama Canal Air Forces. He has been on duty in Panama since September 14, 1923.

Because of the rapid expansion of both commercial and military aviation the increasing demand for training technical air service specialists has led the war department to set aside for the flying personnel many of the highest non-commissioned grades pro-9 vided by congress. Roll was recommended to take the flying tests by his immediate commander because of his excellent record as a soldier. He will take over his new duties as a qualified flight assistant at once,
