FATALLY INJURED IN FALL FROM ROOF

DIES LATER AT HOSPITAL

John Piller, Roofing Company Employee, Found Dying On Sidewalk Tuesday Morn- ing About 10:30

John Piller, 1567 School street,
 Chicago, was fatally injured Tues-
 day morning about 10:30 o'clock
 when he fell from the roof of the
 home of Charles Lundgren, South
 First street.

Piller was an employe of the Elab-
 orated Roofing Co., 4417 Wentworth
 avenue, Chicago. He had worked for
 that firm for more than twenty years.
 He died a short time after being
 taken to the Highland Park hospital.
 Death was attributed to a skull frac-
 ture. Apparently no one saw the ac-
 cident. Piller was working on the
 roof of the Lundgren house. Elmer
 Scheuer, a Yellow Cab taxi driver,
 who was driving by the house, saw
 the man lying on the sidewalk where
 he had fallen.

At an inquest held Wednesday
 morning in the prior undertaking
 purporting a verdict of accidental death
 was returned by the jury.
