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POLICE ARREST RISSMAN

Court Puts High Price on Men Accused of Destroying Waukegan Merchants' Goods With Acid

Sydney Rissman, 1034 Oakley boulevard, Chicago, assistant business manager for the Amalgamated Clothing Workers of America, was arrested last Thursday in Chicago for the Lake county authorities. He is alleged to have been responsible, to some extent, for the vandalism at the Goldstein Clothing Co. plant at Waukegan two weeks age. He was brought to the county jail in Waukegan to be questioned by State's Attorney A. V. Smith.

Caluta Is Freed Prior to the Rissman proceedings, Attorney Field filed habeas corpus proceedings in behalf of Anthony Caluta, 40, a Mexican, 535 Market street, who was held in the basement of the city jail incommunicado. The petitioner, Samuel DeBartolo, Waukegan, said he had information that Caluta was imprisoned in the city jail in an illegal manner, not being booked on any charge and thus making it impossible for him to get out

The court ordered the prisoner produced when admission was made that Caluta was in the city jail. Attorney Field demanded that charges against his client be made and bonds

State's Attorney Smith informed the court that Caluta was arrested some time previous by the city police on a charge of trespassing, when captured at the Kellastone plant tampering with the sprinkler system and released in \$2,000 bonds. The state's attorney said that after his release he received additional information and ordered the man again picked up by the police and lodged in jail.

Two More Charges Col. Smith said warrants had been issued for the arrest of Caluta on charges of malicious mischief and burglary and that he was willing that he be released on bonds, but asked that the bonds be sufficiently high to guarantee his appearance when the matter comes up for hear-

> The state's attorney told the court that a series of outrages had been committed at the Goldstein plant and that Caluta had been caught "redhanded" at a nearby plant with a broken lock of the building in his jossession, after he had tampered with the sprinkler system. He said further that he believed Caluta was a party to conspiracy against the

Bonds Also \$8,000 Judge Edwards fixed bonds of Caluta at \$8,000, the bonds on the burglary charge being \$5,000 and on the malicious mischief charge, \$3,000. In addition he is out on \$2,000 bond on the trespassing tharge. Attorney Field asked for a reduction in bonds but this was opposed by the state's attorney and the bonds were allowed to stay by the court. Frank Tenuta and wife, of 535 Market street, signed the

Caluta is said to have furnished information that hesulted in the arrest of Rissman. | Col. Smith, however, refused to comment on this matter, neither affirming nor denying that such was the case.

Faces Chicago Charge Rissman was arrested in Chicago on a charge of criminal conspiracy on the accusation of David Goldstein of the Goldstein Clothing Cc. He was locked up for a time and later released on bonds by Judge John H. Lyle. Rissman was identified at the Chicago detective bureau by Goldstein as the man who made threats to him three years ago, when there was labor trouble at the Waukegan plant.
